BISHOP MARIANN'S 2022 CONVENTION ADDRESS

THE RIGHT REVEREND MARIANN EDGAR BUDDE, D.MIN., D.D. NINTH BISHOP OF WASHINGTON

January 29, 2022

See, I am doing a new thing

Isaiah 43:19

Ten years ago last November, we began our journey together. Here's a bit of nostalgia – 10 years ago this weekend, presiding at my first Diocesan Convention, I began with these words:

I am among you as a disciple of Jesus, and as one who has come to understand my life's work in service to the spiritual renewal and structural transformation of the Episcopal Church. We have been entrusted with an expression of Christ's gospel that is priceless, and particularly well-suited to our time. For us to fulfill the dreams that God has given us, we need greater spiritual confidence and capacity for ministry.

Think of what it means for you to have a spiritual home with both an appreciation of mystery and the rigors of scientific inquiry for discerning truth, with faith experienced in the creative tension of polarities—heart and mind, word and sacrament, prayer and action. Think of what it means to be part of a church that does not ask its members to agree on theology or biblical interpretation, but trusts in God's grace to unite us, in appreciation of our differences and the conviction that all are welcome at Christ's table.

I still live by these words. To them I now add:

Think of what it means to be part of a Church that's willing to go first, that does not shirk from hard truths, but inspires us to face them with courage.

I believe that God wants us to be a strong and compelling example of what it looks like to follow Jesus – drawing upon the best of our tradition and adapting it to meet the world in which we live.

Today, I recommit myself as your bishop to the spiritual renewal and structural transformation of our church, which includes an honest reckoning with our history, strategic investment in ministries for today, and a hopeful vision for the future.

Thankfully, I didn't come into this work expecting it to be easy, quick, or with a guarantee of success. 18 years of parish ministry in one place taught me the value of taking the long view, moving forward incrementally, as our spiritual forebears did, in stages. I knew that my learning curve would be steep; I would make mistakes; and we would experience setbacks and storms. I also knew that God would be faithful, new opportunities would present themselves, and I would come to love you. Ten years ago this knowledge was in my head. It lives deep inside me now. I am proud to be your bishop. Thank you for your faithfulness; for holding me accountable; and for the countless ways you inspire and bless.

Looking back, one of the more striking aspects of the past ten years has been the constancy of transition. Of our now 86 congregations, all but 8 have experienced

a change in clergy leadership, and some more than one. Some of the transitions have been smooth; others less so. All have required tremendous energy on your part. We begin 2022 with 34 congregations in transition, which is to say with an Interim Rector, Priest-in-Charge, or Supply. There have been equivalent transitions in staff and lay leadership. Transition has been a reality on the diocesan staff as well.

The Church is not unique here. In recent years, we've witnessed a large turnover in leadership and staff everywhere. Add to that the more dramatic social upheavals we've gone through, and small wonder that a common refrain is one of weariness.

We're entering a third year of world-wide pandemic. As communities centered in Jesus, you have gone the extra mile to assist your neighbors who are experiencing food insecurity or homelessness, loneliness or grief. You've done this amid the intense pressures of holding your own lives and families together.

The pandemic helped bring to the surface hard truths about who we are as a nation. You have remained steadfast in facing those truths, examining our historic and ongoing complicity in racism, even after the public outcry after George Floyd's murder faded. Then, on top of everything else, when refugees from Afghanistan began arriving into our region by the thousands, you responded with generosity and compassion, ably led by our wondrous cadre of deacons.

Finally, in worship and Christian formation, you've had to adapt to continually changing levels of risk caused by COVID, pivoting back and forth, and learning new skills in order to keep people in your communities connected to one another. While this was and remains a steep learning curve for all of us, look how far we've come.

For all the goodness that has been gleaned in this crucible time, we are understandably tired. But as the Rev. Glenna Huber recently reminded those of us gathered for an ordination service, when we are wearied by the chances and changes in this life, we can find rest in God's eternal changelessness. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever.

She told us of a conversation she had in a city park with a person experiencing homelessness. He lamented the many hardships he's endured and Glenna listened. She offered a blessing. He thanked her, and then blessed her in return. He said, "Never forget that when things get tough, God does not abandon. God will carry us until we can walk again."

May this man's faith be our inspiration. For nothing can separate us from the love of God. Jesus is with us, as he promised he would be, to the end of age.

Iesus is here. And so are we.

Our friends at the Unstuck Group encourage us to view where we are now as our starting point for future ministry. That doesn't mean that everything before the pandemic is lost to us. But it does mean that the pandemic is changing some things permanently. We are being changed. I think of the biblical patriarch Jacob, who forever walked with a limp after his night of wrestling with an angel. The change for us is that big, and there is pain involved. But God is doing a new thing.

As we cast our collective gaze to the year ahead, I have some things on my heart to say. Please take from this whatever resonates for you and is helpful.

My first word to you – and to myself – is **rest**. Many have told me that they have all but forgotten how to rest, some honestly acknowldging that even before the pandemic they weren't all that good at it. But they are really tired now.

I realize that calling for rest can seem tone-deaf when so much is demanded of us, like the time my asthmatic infant's pediatrician told me that I needed more sleep. There are times in life when rest is elusive. I feel that way now. Yet if we don't take time to rest, it will be forced upon us in the form of a crisis. The theologian Howard Thurman, who was no stranger to the harsher realities of life, once wrote: "One thing we can and must do is find sources of strength and renewal for our own spirits, lest we perish."

In early February, I will send a letter to congregational leaders, asking that they give everyone in their church's employ a week of paid Sabbath leave, not counted against vacation or sick leave. Some have already done something similar, and I'm grateful for your example. For those congregations with little or no paid staff, consider some kind of rest period for your volunteers. There are many ways this can be done, and your diocesan staff and regional deans – from whom this request came to me – are here to help. This is a request, not a mandate, but it's important. Sabbath, as the Jewish philosopher Abraham Joshua Heschel reminds us, is "time to mend our tattered lives." For many, life is tattered now.

I wish I could suggest the same for everyone in your places of work, and give all parents and care-givers a week to rest. What I can do is remind us all to be kind to one another and realistic in our expectations. The Rev. Jenifer Gamber's words to our Tending Our Soil congregations are worth repeating for all: "We aren't falling behind. We are responding to the world as it is."

Similarly, in her New Year's Blessing, the Lutheran pastor Nadia Bolz Weber prayed that we all might lower our expectations in 2022 – lower our expectations of ourselves, so that we be might be grateful for each tiny accomplishment; lower our expectations of people around us so that we might cherish them as they are; and lower our expectations of the supply chain and service industry so that we might focus more on what we do get and less on what we don't. With lower expectations, she writes, we are free to celebrate every blessing that comes to us, however small.³ Now I'm a high expectations kind of person, and Nadia's blessing has been a godsend to me, even as I strive to do my best.

In the same vein, the second word I propose for the year ahead is **simplify**. Surely part of the new thing God is doing includes an invitation to focus our energies on fewer things, the most essential things, and whenever possible, to share one another's burdens.

You don't have to do everything alone. As you plan your ministry offerings, for example, remember that we now have a robust <u>School for Christian Faith and Leadership</u> that you can turn to, with a wide range of resources. Among those offerings is a series on the foundations of faith called *Discover. Embrace. Become.* With it you can encourage your people to drink from the deep, restorative wells of faith. There are also on-demand trainings for new vestry members and treasurers and many other practical resources.

As you look for ways to engage or deepen in works of justice and mercy, remember that there are many with whom you can collaborate. Also, as you plan worship, you can lean on other congregations, including our Cathedral. It's okay to rest as a congregation, even on a Sunday morning. Please don't feel you need to exhaust yourself during Holy Week this year. However you choose to worship, God is with you. Simplify your offerings and collaborate with one another.

The third and final word I offer today (actually three words): **stay the course**. Rest and simplicity are in the service to what God is doing. Trust that the One who has begun a good work among you will bring it to completion.

We will stay the course with our strategic plan. While the pandemic initially felt like a setback, I'm now persuaded that through the hard work of planning God was preparing us to navigate through what lay ahead. Fixing our eyes on a few strategic goals each year has served us well.

We will continue on the path God has set before us. We now have key practices and lasting tools that we will turn to again and again, among them, the 7 Vital Signs for Congregational Health. Tending Our Soil remains our most comprehensive investment in congregational vitality and we're now accepting applicants for the second cohort of 12 congregations. The School for Christian Faith and Leadership will continue to inspire our people to grow in faith and equip our leaders to lead well. And we will continue to partner in ministries of equity & justice for greater impact in our communities.

In staying the course, we turn our attention to two goals of the strategic plan for which we are now able to give focused priority. The goals aren't new, for God has already placed them on our hearts, and work on them is well underway. What is new is that we are naming them, adding them to our established rhythm of 90-day Action Plans, and holding ourselves accountable for moving forward.

Both goals are future oriented and give priority to rising generations.

THE FIRST OF THESE NEW GOALS FOR 2022 IS TO PROMOTE CREATION CARE PRACTICES IN ALL OUR COMMUNITIES.

The compounding realities of climate change and other environmental concerns are cause for alarm. Yet for many – myself included – the problems sometimes seem distant. Fortunately, the Holy Spirit is at work across the globe and in our congregations, inspiring many to action for the care of God's creation in concrete ways. This year we will create the means to amplify and expand the efforts of our creation care leaders, share best practices among us, and establish regional and diocesan goals for reducing waste, preserving natural resources, and lowering our carbon footprint. Later this morning we will commission the Diocesan Creation Care Team to lead this effort. Its first 90-Day Action Plan is to take stock of all our congregations. Please pray for them and join them. To learn more, please contact Hazel Monae, our Missioner for Equity and Justice, or a Creation Care team member directly.

The second of our 2022 goals is to launch or relaunch up to three worshiping communities focused on rising generations, so that we become a spiritual home for our children and grandchildren.

This goal emerged from the recognition that the average age of nearly all congregations in the diocese is significantly higher than that of their surrounding neighborhoods. While we intend to equip all congregations that seek to grow younger – about which I'll speak in a moment – it's clear that the churches with the greatest success in growing young are those that make reaching rising generations their top priority. We intend to establish up to three worshiping communities for whom that is the case.

This year we'll begin with a time of listening to identify where it would be most fruitful to invest in worshiping communities for rising generations and then cultivate that soil. In the first 90 days, we will create working teams to study demographics, get out in the neighborhoods, take stock of resources, and identify those who God is calling to this work. This past December, we met with 15 such leaders for an initial conversation, and those conversations will continue and grow. For this will not be a diocesan staff driven effort alone, but one undertaken in deep consultation and partnership with regional leaders.

The diocese has planted several congregations in the not too distant past: St. Nicholas Germantown in the 1990s, and all our Spanish-speaking communities, mostly within and in partnership with English-speaking congregations. We are blessed now with three Latino clergy serving as rector or priest-in-charge of mutli-cultural congregations worshiping in two languages. In 2017, with support from the wider Episcopal Church, we began Misa Magdalena in Silver Spring, within the parish bounds of St. Mary Magdalene. Going forward, Misa Magdalena seeks to be a mission of the diocese, focused on the large Latino-Hispanic community in the eastern side of Montgomery County. It is a young church for a young population of mostly 2nd and 3rd generation Latinos who grew up in this country speaking both languages with broad, eclectic cultural influences.

Breadth of cultural influence is the norm among rising generations.

Here is my invitation: If your church is in or near a region or near people who are significantly younger than your current membership; if young people are finding their way to you; if you are a young leader, or if you, no matter your age, feel called to join in this early-stage work of ministry with rising generations, please let me know.

The primary focus here will be on the needs, aspirations, and worship preferences of young people who are not currently engaged with us. Given the diversity of life experience, cultural background, racial identity and socioeconomic realities of people under 35, we can expect these communities to be different from one another and from what we're offering now. For if what we were offering now was successful in reaching rising generations, we wouldn't need to do anything new. God is doing something new here, and so must we.

Let me speak now to the desire to grow younger in congratulations across the diocese. To be sure, some congregations are places with high percentages of mostly older generations, and their ministries understandably reflect their context. Yet for those whose context is younger, and who wish to learn and grow young, we will provide resources and encourage collaboration in ministries with and for young people. It will take time, and our work will begin, as we heard powerfully in the testimonies last evening, with listening.

We're blessed that the Rev. Amanda Akes-Caldwell will be joining Diocesan staff next week as Missioner for Christian Formation and Development. Amanda comes to this position with a passion to build on the resources and relationships throughout the diocese to create strong intergenerational ministries in our congregations. She will work collaboratively with you to offer regional and diocesan-wide gatherings for students, and young adults. Alongside others, she will help anchor our Rising Generations initiatives.

Among the resources that the Rev. Jenifer Gamber is preparing to offer through the School for Christian Faith and Leadership is *Growing Young: 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church*. It's based on a national study of over 250 congregations of different denominations, sizes, geographic locations, and racial/cultural identities – 50% were congregations of color. From that research the investigators identified 6 core commitments of congregations that have successfully engaged 15-29 year olds and as a result are growing spiritually, missionally and numerically.

You'll be glad to know that the six commitments do not require your congregation to become something it's not. But they do invite you into deep relationships with the young people in your life and to reach out to the young people in your neighborhoods. For those of us who are no longer young, they ask us to gracefully give up our primacy in congregational life. The commitments are:

- 1. Share leadership to receive the gifts of others, especially young people.
- 2. Empathize with today's young people, stepping into their shoes.
- **3.** Take Jesus' message seriously and welcome young people into a Jesus-centered way of life.
- **4. Nurture warmth in your community** and aim for meaningful peer and intergenerational relationships.
- **5. Prioritize young people (and families) everywhere** and look for creative ways to tangibly support, resource and invite them in every facet of your congregation.
- **6. Be good neighbors**, and provide opportunities for and support young people to serve others, locally, nationally, and globally.

If you would like to gather in a small group to read *Growing Young*, the School for Christian Faith and Leadership will provide up to four books for each congregation. Our only stipulation is that you identify the group of readers first, tell us what your hopes are in reading it together, and when you are finished, share with what you learned and how you will implement one or more of the six strategies. The Rev. Jenifer Gamber will send a survey to clergy next week to indicate their interest.

I realize that many of our congregations that enjoyed ministries with lively youth, young adults and families before COVID have seen a decline in their engagement, which has been discouraging. But that doesn't mean we can give up. The needs are great, and we are learning ways to reach out, with open and listening hearts.

I believe that congregations made up of mostly people my age or older are uniquely equipped to succeed in growing young. For we who are over 60 are in the season of generativity, a time for taking an active and participatory role in the world through

teaching, mentoring, and sharing wisdom with people besides ourselves and our immediate family. It's our time to encourage younger leaders and contribute to the needs of the <u>next generation</u>.

Eldership involves sacrificial love, letting go of some of the things we hold dear in order to make room for the new thing that God is doing with and for our children and grandchildren. The good news is that as we do this, we grow into the elders that young people want to be around, and the vibrancy they bring to our congregations will give us great joy. Indeed, we are transformed by these relationships.

Let me close with a word about my tenure as bishop. As I said earlier, I began this work with the expectation that I would be bishop for at least as long as I had been a rector. That is still my hope, with your consent. During my annual review last year, I told the Standing Committee and Diocesan Council that, with their blessing, I would commit without reservation for five more years. By 2026, we will have completed the five years of this first strategic plan and be in an evaluation phase, positioning ourselves for a new strategic process. At that 15 year mark of my episcopate, we'll need to prayerfully determine if it's best for us to continue together another five years. If the answer is yes, that's what we'll do. If not, we will begin the process for a smooth leadership transition, which for bishop positions usually takes two years. My goal, for whenever I give the crozier to your next bishop, is for the diocese to be strong, healthy, and well-equipped for its next season of ministry, with rising leaders in place throughout diocesan and congregational life.

To that end, I rededicate myself to God and our ministry, and invite you, as you feel called, to do the same. May God give us the grace and courage to **rest, simplify and stay the course**. For God is doing a new thing, and we are blessed to be part of it.

JOURNAL OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF WASHINGTON

The One Hundred Twenty-Seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of Washington was held virtually on January 29, 2022.

CALL TO ORDER

The President of the Convention, the Right Reverend Mariann Edgar Budde, Bishop of Washington, called the Convention to order at 9:13 a.m.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE PRESENCE OF A QUORUM

The President appointed Mr. Keith Roachford, St. George's, DC, as Coordinator for the Dispatch of Business and Mr. John van de Weert, Jr., St. Monica's and St. James', as Parliamentarian.

Mr. Roachford reported that more than 50 clerical and 50 lay delegates having registered, a quorum was present. The President then declared the Convention to be in session.

ADOPTION OF THE CONSENT AGENDA

Mr. Roachford moved adoption of the Consent Agenda, which included the agenda, the appointment of officers, other required appointments, and Resolution 1: On Christ Church Accokeek's Separation from the Diocese of Washington. There were no requests to remove items from the Consent Agenda. Consent was given by a majority. (All votes for this Convention were conducted via online voting.)

RECEIPT OF NEW RESOLUTIONS

REPORT ON NOMINATIONS

Mr. Roachford presented the report of nominees for elective office. No nominations were made from the floor. It was moved and seconded that nominations be closed. The motion was approved by a unanimous vote. The President directed the tellers to prepare the ballots.

CASTING OF THE FIRST BALLOT

Mr. Roachford provided voting instructions, and delegates cast the first ballot.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS

The Rt. Rev. Budde delivered the annual address to the Convention. The text can be found in the section of this *Journal* titled "The Bishop's Convention Address."

TENDING OUR SOIL UPDATE

The President introduced a video showing some of the activities of the first cohort of 12 congregations in the Diocese participating in the Tending Our Soil initiative. In the

video, several participants expressed their desire to support the growth and health of their congregations. The Rt. Rev. Budde encouraged congregations to consider joining the 2022 or 2023 cohort.

COMMISSIONING OF THE CREATION CARE TASK FORCE

In line with the Strategic Plan, the Diocese commissioned a Task Force to serve as a resource for congregations and the Diocese to create lasting change and deepen the commitment to care for all of creation. The Rt. Rev. Budde confirmed the Co-Chairs, Ms. Melissa Sites and Mr. Doug Holy.

REPORT OF THE TELLERS ON THE FIRST BALLOT

Ms. D'Oniece Dillard, Epiphany, DC, Head Teller, reported the results of the first round of balloting for Diocesan offices. A tabulation of the results can be found in the section of this Journal titled "Report of the Tellers."

Ms. Dillard declared that a second ballot was needed to determine the second clerical member of the Standing Committee.

CASTING OF THE SECOND BALLOT

Mr. Roachford provided voting instructions, and delegates cast the second ballot.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Mr. Jonathan Nicholas, Treasurer, summarized the Diocesan budget for the year just ended (noting that the following figures have not been finalized). He said the Diocese received a clean audit for fiscal year 2020.

The Diocese achieved a balanced budget for 2021 thanks in part to higher-than-expected congregational giving (about \$360,000 above the projected \$2 million). The budget for 2021 provided for limited draws on long-term assets (e.g., the Soper Fund) to support operations. At the end of 2021, the Diocese realized higher-than-expected income from miscellaneous sources because it was able to support more events than anticipated. Interest and dividends from investments for 2021 were higher than projected. The Bishop's annual appeal fell short of projections. When all revenue for the year was assessed, the total fell approximately \$130,000 short of the budget estimates. However, expenses were reduced by \$130,000, primarily because of lower ministry and administrative expenses (e.g., the Diocese deferred hiring new staff).

The Diocesan investment portfolio realized \$84,000 in losses (an expected result of selling investment assets that are not performing well to balance the portfolio), but unrealized gains (*i.e.*, investments that are not sold) increased in value by more than \$417,000, resulting in a net gain of \$334,000. Total assets were valued at \$126,459,911, with liabilities of \$29,914,542, leaving total net assets valued at \$96,545,368. The approximately \$30 million in liabilities represents the investments made by individual parishes and placed in the Diocese's investment fund. Of the assets, 62 percent are

permanently restricted, meaning the Diocese can only spend the returns generated by the principal. Furthermore, 28 percent of the assets are temporarily restricted, meaning the Diocese can spend all of the money as long as it complies with the donor's requirements (although good stewardship dictates that some of the money be retained). Finally, 10 percent of the assets are unrestricted, and the Diocese can spend the money as it deems appropriate.

The Soper Fund supports the Diocesan budget. The value of the fund increased by \$4 million in 2021, and that figure represents the value after the transfer of some of the earnings to support 2021 spending.

Presentation and Adoption of the 2022 Diocesan Budget

Mr. Stephen Gibson, Redeemer, Bethesda, Chair of the Finance Committee, presented the proposed budget for 2022. Congregational giving is projected to be \$2.3 million – the same amount that was received in 2021. To ensure the long-term growth of the Soper Fund, the Finance Committee reduced the percentage of the amount allotted for the annual budget from five percent to 4.8 percent. Even with the decrease, the Soper Fund will provide \$188,000 for the 2022 budget, thanks to increased value of the investments. Funding from the Lilly Endowment Grant, a five-year grant to support the Tending Our Soil initiative, plus contributions from parishes participating in the initiative, are projected to account for \$247,200. The budget includes \$65,000 from the Corten Education Fund to support the School for Christian Faith and Leadership. The Bishop's Annual Appeal is expected to raise \$180,000. The Diocese expects to earn \$100,000 in interest and dividend income and \$90,000 from various other sources. Another \$25,000 from grants and reserve funds is budgeted for the Latino ministry. Total revenue for 2022 is projected to be \$4.759 million.

On the expense side, the 2022 budget reflects the strategic priorities of reaching rising generations and focusing on creation care, as indicated in new line items for new worshipping communities and environmental justice. The Diocese's support for the Episcopalian Church remains at 15 percent of operating revenue. Diocesan staff will receive a three-percent cost-of-living increase in pay.

The category of Diocesan ministries accounts for 64 percent of the budget, the largest expense. This category includes Strategic Plan implementation and other services for church and ministry development, Latino ministry support, and social justice and advocacy efforts. The budget also accounts for national and international ministries, which includes Diocesan contributions to the Episcopal Church and the Provincial Synod.

General administration costs (e.g., staff time and general overhead) account for 16 percent of the 2022 budget, and governance expenses (e.g., maintaining databases, conducting the annual Diocesan Convention, convening the Council and committees, and attending the General Convention) account for four percent. Mr. Gibson noted that the shift from the planned in-person Convention in 2022 to a virtual one will substantially decrease related expenses. Communications expenses cover the preparation and coordination of online publications and other messaging to parishes and the general public. Development costs include outreach for the Bishop's annual appeal. Total expenses for 2022 are projected to be \$4.759 billion, resulting in a balanced budget.

Mr. Gibson said the proposed 2022 budget takes into account the continued challenges posed by the pandemic and moved adoption of the budget as presented.

Discussion

The Rev. Catherine Ballinger, St. Paul's, K Street, asked why the 2022 budget for Diocesan confirmation was 2.5 times higher than for 2021. The Rt. Rev. Budde said there were few confirmations in 2021, and none at the Washington National Cathedral, but it is hoped that more confirmations will take place in 2022.

The Rev. Peter Jarrett-Schell, Calvary Church, said his congregation hoped that the 2022 budget would reflect the priority on youth ministry and that the Diocese would reinstate the position of Youth Commissioner. The 2022 budget lines for youth ministry and young adult ministry only indicate an additional \$2,500 more than 2021. The Rt. Rev. Budde said there was robust conversation about whether the new position of Missioner for Faith Formation and Development, to be filled by the Rev. Amanda Akes-Cardwell, should be positioned solely around youth or rather as an intergenerational approach with a priority on youth, and the Diocesan Council settled on the latter. Among those who gave input, many families expressed that the intergenerational approach is more fruitful. The Rt. Rev. Budde said the Diocese aims to build a network of leaders committed to youth ministry and strong programs for young people across the Diocese.

Ms. Pam Brewer, St. Anne's, said the three-percent cost-of-living increase seemed low and asked whether it could be increased. The Rt. Rev. Budde said the amount aligns with the recommendation of the Human Resources Committee. The Finance Committee adopted the recommendation and suggested that congregations throughout the Diocese consider doing so for their staff. Congregations can adjust as their resources allow.

Without further discussion, the budget was approved by a majority.

PRESENTATION FROM THE REPARATIONS TASK FORCE

The Rev. Peter Jarrett-Schell, Calvary Church, Chair of the Reparations Task Force, explained the group's mission to address the history and legacy of slavery and ongoing racism within the Episcopal Church, investigate the truth, and make restitution for harms. He pointed out that reparations are not intended to reduce the harms of the past to a dollar amount, but restoration must include some financial sacrifice. Ms. Hazel Monae, Missioner for Equity and Justice, observed that Christians have been complicit, and it is necessary to tell the truth. The steps toward repairing the breach are part of the wider call for becoming a beloved community. The Rev. Peter Jarrett-Schell added that the work will take time and the broader effort will be ongoing, but the Task Force will focus on concrete steps that yield results.

Members of the Task Force have begun researching the legacy of slavery in relation to their own churches. Ms. Cathy O'Donnell, St. John's, Norwood, an archivist, noted that every parish has a connection to racial injustice. Since September 2021, the Reparations Task Force has facilitated monthly virtual meetings of an archivists' subgroup; all congregations are invited to join. Several members of the subgroup described their research findings so far, offering insights into the earliest participation of Black people in their congregations, founders' use of enslaved people on the land where their churches reside, and the segregation of Black and White congregants.

The Diocese has commissioned two broad research projects, which are now underway. The first will analyze how the Diocese benefitted from, participated in, and supported chattel slavery from the initiation of the slave trade in the United States through abolition. The second will assess others' efforts around reparation to identify best practices and lessons learned. It is anticipated that these projects will be completed within a year, and the results will be published. The results of the projects will inform how the Diocese selects partners and spends its money.

Ms. Monae noted that to ensure accountability, the Reparations Task Force must be in relationship with stakeholders who have been directly affected by the legacy of slavery—that is, Black people in the region the Diocese serves. Ms. Monae emphasized that there is no monolithic voice that can represent all Black people, so the Task Force will make space and time for responses from many people as it seeks to move the Diocese toward relational repair. The Task Force plans to present a proposal for financial restitution in 2024. The Rev. Peter Jarrett-Schell urged interested congregants to join the effort and to reach out to Black-led organizations in their parishes that focus on economic empowerment to begin building relationships that will be essential as the Diocese rolls out reparations. For more information, email reparations@edow.org. The Rt. Rev. Budde thanked the Task Force and the congregants participating in historical investigations of their churches.

REPORT OF THE TELLERS ON THE SECOND BALLOT

Ms. Dillard declared that a third ballot was needed to determine the second clerical member of the Standing Committee.

CASTING OF THE THIRD BALLOT

Mr. Roachford provided voting instructions, and delegates cast the third ballot.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

Mr. Tony Koe, Chair of the Committee on the Constitution and Canons, delivered the report. He described five items amending the Constitution that were not open for debate or voting. These items will be open for discussion at the next Convention and require votes of approval at two successive Conventions. The first three items were raised at the One Hundred Twenty-Sixth Convention in 2021 and address the unanticipated challenges posed by a public health emergency. They would (1) provide explicit authority to conduct remote electronic meetings, (2) allow for an emergency expedited process to amend the Constitution, and (3) waive some procedural requirements related to conduct of the Convention when there is unanimous consent.

The fourth item indicates that the Committee will amend canons to clarify that the term "disability" is intended to refer to the inability to perform the duties of an office. The fifth item indicates that the Committee will amend the canons that provide for Regional Assemblies to nominate individuals to stand for election to the Standing Committee at the annual Convention.

Mr. Koe presented two amendments for debate and voting. First, given that St. John's Parish of Accokeek (Christ Church Accokeek) is no longer a parish in the Diocese of

Washington and is no longer affiliated with the Episcopal Church, the Committee moves to amend the canons, striking "St. John's Parish" from section 2301(b)(8).

Second, in 2018, the One Hundred Twenty-Third Convention established a pilot program for conducting the business of Regional Assembly using alternatives to inperson meetings, such as remote electronic meetings and electronic voting. Such alternatives became critical when the COVID-19 pandemic prevented in-person meetings. The pilot program will expire February 15, 2022. As individuals have become accustomed to and appreciative of the benefits of conducting business electronically, the Committee proposes to amend the canons to allow the business of Regional Assemblies to be conducted in person, electronically, or through a combination of both, including electronic communication, nominations, and voting. The proposed amendment would provide more flexibility in conducting the Regional Assemblies.

Discussion

Mr. Charles Day, St. John's, Broad Creek, suggested that the amendment to strike "St. John's Parish" from section 2301(b)(8) specify Accokeek to distinguish it from other parishes that share the name of St. John. The President indicated that no such change is needed given the context. The proposed amendment to the canon was approved by a majority.

The proposed amendments to allow flexibility in the conduct of Regional Assembly business and meetings were approved by a majority.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Mr. Roachford presented the report. Six resolutions were submitted. Resolution 1: On Christ Church of Accokeek's Separation from the Diocese of Washington, was included in the Consent Agenda and was approved by a majority.

RESOLUTION 1: ON CHRIST CHURCH, ACCOKEEK'S SEPARATION FROM THE DIOCESE OF WASHINGTON (ADOPTED)

RESOLVED, that the Convention commends the leadership of Bishop Mariann and the Standing Committee for showing gracious restraint and pastoral leadership in the matter of Christ Church, Accokeek amicably separating from the Episcopal Diocese of Washington; and be it further,

RESOLVED, that the Convention endorses and affirms Bishop Mariann's public statement on April 29th, 2021 saying, "I am personally grateful to Father Brian Vander Wel, Mr. Frank McDonough, and all the leaders of Christ Church for the spirit in which we entered and completed this process together. May God bless and guide them and those they lead in their lives and ministries."

EXPLANATION

On April 29th, 2021 it was publicly announced that the Episcopal Diocese of Washington and Christ Church Accokeek reached terms of an amicable separation. Amicable parish departures in the Episcopal Church are rare, especially those involving property. In recent years more often than not parties involved have entered into pitched legal battles and messy public spats. Bishop Mariann and the Standing Committee showed exceptional leadership in rising above a situation that all too easily could have devolved into a publicly tense and legally adversarial relationship. While a parish's departure from the Church is inherently regrettable, such a deterioration would have caused even greater harm to the Body of Christ. Such adversarial departures take place at a great financial cost and serve to deepen existing entrenched divisions. Because the outcome here is so rare in the Church, it is important that the Diocese as a whole via this resolution of convention formally and concretely lift up, affirm, and praise both the substance and form of this separation. If such separations are to happen, then we hope such a resolution will encourage leaders here and elsewhere to follow in these footsteps.

Discussion

The Resolution was approved by a majority.

RESOLUTION 2: TO INCLUDE THE NAME BISHOP BARBARA CLEMENTINE HARRIS IN THE LESSER FEASTS & FASTS CALENDAR (ADOPTED)

RESOLVED, the House of _____ concurring, that this 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church hereby directs the inclusion the name Bishop Barbara Clementine Harris in the Lesser Feasts & Fasts Calendar of The Episcopal Church, and authorize trial use of the proper for the triennial 2023-2024 to be celebrated on March 13; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this 80th General Convention approve the appropriate proper to be prepared by the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Church publishes Lesser Feasts & Fasts, which contains feast days for the various men and women the Church wishes to honor. Bishop Harris died on March 13, 2020. While the typical process calls for such a resolution, seeking to add a name to the Calendar, be presented at two successive General Conventions, there have been exceptions to this rule. For example, the Episcopal Church added Jonathan Myrick Daniels to its Lesser Feasts and Fasts calendar of commemorations in 1994. His feast day is August 14, the day of his arrest. It seems appropriate in this case since Bishop Harris was a woman of color as well as the first woman ordained bishop, which will not change over time.

Barbara C. Harris (1930 – 2020) became the first woman to be ordained a bishop in the worldwide Anglican Communion on February 11, 1989. Her years of episcopal

leadership were filled with traveling and witnessing, preaching, and teaching and administering the sacraments. A gifted storyteller known for her quick wit and raspy-voiced delivery, she was also a spirited and sought-after preacher of hymn laced, Gospelgrounded sermons, and an outspoken advocate for, in her words, "the least, the lost and the left out." With great grace, she worked tirelessly serving the people of the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts as their Suffragan Bishop for 13 years, until her retirement in 2002.

After her retirement, she served from 2003 until 2007 as an Assisting Bishop in the Diocese of Washington (DC) where she won many friends and colleagues.

Discussion

The Resolution was approved by a majority.

RESOLUTION 3: ON CREATION OF A TASK FORCE ON BLACK MINISTRIES FOR THE DIOCESE OF WASHINGTON (ADOPTED)

RESOLVED, that the 127th Convention of the Diocese of Washington establish a Task Force on Black Ministries to study the revitalization of Black Churches in the Episcopal Diocese of Washington; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a Task Force on Black Ministries be appointed by the Diocesan Council consisting of members of churches (task force of ten) that are historically black or who have a significant Black membership to include representation from the Union of Black Episcopalians, DC Chapter; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Task Force on Black Ministries will complete its work by September 1, 2022 and make recommendations to the Diocesan Council to enhance, revitalize, and empower Black churches and Black parishioners in the Diocese of Washington; and be it further

RESOLVED, that This Task Force on Black Ministries will examine issues such as racism and its impact on the vitality of Black Churches in the Diocese of Washington, strategies needed specifically to ensure vitality of Black Churches in the Diocese of Washington, and specific resources needed to make these strategies successful.

EXPLANATION

The National Episcopal Church has an Office of Black ministries with the mission to inspire, transform and empower the people of the African Diaspora to live fully into the Jesus Movement. The missional priorities of this office include the following: To provide an overview of and/or processes for developing congregations' vitality through investment in people, to educate and empower congregations and leaders to engage in processes for strategic revitalization, and to develop and support lay and ordained leadership.

The Task Force on Black Ministries would be charged using these missional priorities to look at past injustices and to develop strategies and the resources needed to make Black parishes viable in the diocese. There have been some historically Black Episcopal Churches that have closed or that face significant challenges in vitality. It is critical to maintain their vitality because as noted in a report in the Philadelphia Tribune,

75 percent of Black priest come from Black parishes¹. Their vitality is critical to ensure the representation of Black clergy in the diocese. Also, the Task Force on Black Ministries would examine practices and models in evangelism, worship, and mission that would be more conducive to their revitalization from the Black church perspective.

The initial creation of the Task Force on Black Ministries will not require funding at this time if the Task Force is established via the resolution. However, there may be budget implications with the recommendations that the Task Force on Black Ministries may recommend. These recommendations will be submitted via resolution for the Diocesan Convention in 2023 in accordance with the provision that outline resolutions that have fiscal/budget impact.

Discussion

The Rev. Dominique Peridans, Ascension and St. Agnes, asked what the new Task Force would do that is not otherwise addressed by the Race and Social Justice Committee, the Reparations Task Force, the Missioner for Equity and Justice, or the Union of Black Episcopalians. The Rev. Ricardo Sheppard, Atonement, a co-sponsor of the Resolution, replied that unlike the other entities, the Task Force would look directly at the revitalization of Black churches, which is outside of the scope of the Union of Black Episcopalians.

Mike Livingston, Calvary Church, moved to specify that members of the Washington, DC, chapter of the Union of Black Episcopalians should be included on the Task Force.

Livingston amendment to the Resolution on Creation of a Task Force on Black Ministries for the Diocese of Washington (Adopted)

RESOLVED, that a Task Force on Black Ministries be appointed by the Diocesan Council consisting of members of churches (task force of ten) that are historically black or who have a significant Black membership, to include representation of the Union of Black Episcopalians, DC Chapter;

The Rev. Linda Mahler, St. Thomas', DC, asked why the Resolution specified that the Task Force would conclude its work by September 1, 2022. The Rev. Baxter said that by concluding its work at that time, the Task Force could submit resolutions in time for the 2023 Diocesan Convention and put forward a report to the 2023 Convention.

The Resolution was approved by a majority.

RESOLUTION 4: ON CONFRONTING CHRISTIAN ZIONISM (ADOPTED)

Rick Miles, Interim Rector, Grace Church, Georgetown; the Rev. David Wacaster, Rector, Good Shepherd; Mr. Thomas Getman, St. Mark's, DC; Ms. Mary Neznek, St. Mark's, DC; Mr. John W. Harbeson, Redeemer; Mr. James Hamilton, Grace Church, Georgetown

RESOLVED, that the 127th Convention of the Diocese of Washington submit the following resolution to the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church:

RESOLVED, the House of concurring, that the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church reject the theology of Christian Zionism as a modern misinterpretation of scripture having no connection to the Creeds or the Prayer Book; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Convention condemn the political policy positions promoted by such a theology.

EXPLANATION:

Christian Zionism is the theological belief that the establishment of the modern Jewish State of Israel in 1948 is a biblically mandated precondition for the Second Coming of Christ.

It originates from a theology called dispensationalism, which was developed in the 1830s by John Nelson Darby, an ex-priest of the Church of Ireland. Through an excessively literalist reading of Scripture, dispensationalism sections off the Bible into distinct, standalone periods (or dispensations), claiming that God has a different standard of dealings with humanity in each of these periods. The theological conclusion of dispensationalism is that God has a separate plan of salvation for the Jewish

people than for the Church. Also, according to Darby, the return of the Jewish people to their ancient land would trigger the events of the Second Coming of Christ.

Over the next few decades, dispensationalism grew in popularity both in England and the United States, and was the theological impetus for literalist Christians to support the creation of a Jewish homeland in Palestine (eventually referred to as Christian Zionism). With the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, Christian Zionism spread dramatically, as many literalist Christians believed themselves to be witnessing the fulfillment of Biblical prophecy, and the first clear sign that the countdown to Armageddon had begun.

Today, this theologically flawed, literalist approach continues to support the belief that loving God must go hand-in-hand with blind support of the State of Israel without necessarily understanding the biblically unsound and very recent theological roots of Christian Zionism. In addition, it is crucial for the Episcopal Church to recognize that Christian Zionist teachings arise entirely from a Western colonial interpretation of the Bible, which corrupts God's promises in the Hebrew Scriptures, the Gospel message of justice and love, and the Baptismal Covenant. Christian Zionism is a harmful, nationalistic theology that erroneously views the Jewish people from a purely instrumental and distorted perspective of Christian eschatology. Furthermore, Christian Zionism has a very tangible negative impact on both the indigenous Palestinians, whom it sees as mere bystanders, if not obstacles to the fulfillment of God's providence, and to any attempts at a peace process since returning annexed land to the Palestinians threatens the necessary conditions for the fulfilment of prophecy. Thus, Christian Zionism has been used to support the State of Israel's continued annexation of the entire land of Palestine-Israel, and the displacement and oppression of the indigenous Palestinian people, including our Christian and Muslim brothers and sisters. Cathedral Canon John Peterson, co-sponsor of this resolution, spent 12 years living in Jerusalem, as Dean of St. George's College. Canon Peterson reports, "I have witnessed first-hand the destructive impact that Christian Zionists have on the Church in Jerusalem, upon

all Palestinians of whatever faith or no faith, and upon the prospects of peace in the long-suffering Holy Land."

Adoption of this Resolution has no impact on the Diocesan budget.

Discussion

The Rev. Ateek summarized the rationale for the Resolution, stating that theology is not just an intellectual exercise but affects our decisions, how we live, and how we vote. Christian Zionism is pervasive and deceptive in one way: the Scripture talks about Zionism, Israel, and Israelis in reference to ancient Israel. Those who are less educated or who interpret Scripture very literally believe these terms apply to the modern State of Israel. The current form of Christian Zionism is not an ancient belief but a nineteenth-century phenomenon that has implications on the current Israeli-Palestinian conflict. The Rev. Ateek said it is important for Episcopalians to educate themselves and to distance the Church from any theology that says God favors one group over another. Christian Zionism supports the State of Israel as a way to speed up the Second Coming of Christ, which transfers the hope of the Church from resting on Christ to resting on the outcome of a particular political situation, which can be insidious and damaging. The Resolution is important because there are strong forces lobbying to ignore any efforts for peace and to press that Israel must have complete control over the land for Christ to return.

The Rev. Lesley Krauland, St. Luke's, Trinity Parish, supported the Resolution. Mike Livingston, Calvary Church, said his congregation needed more time to consider the Resolution and input from the Diocese to define terms used in the Resolution. Mr. Livingston moved to delay voting on the Resolution until the Diocese of Washington can provide definitions and its position on Christian Zionism. The motion was seconded.

The motion to delay consideration of the Resolution was rejected by a majority.

Mr. Getman, a co-sponsor of the Resolution, said the website ChristianZionism.org is a useful resource that provides a well-thought-through definition of Christian Zionism. The Rev. Melana Nelson-Amaker, St. Christopher's, pointed out that delaying the vote would table the Resolution until the 2023 Convention.

The Rev. Wacaster, a co-sponsor of the Resolution, called the question. A supermajority voted in favor of calling the question.

The Resolution was approved by a majority.

RESOLUTION 5: ON OPPOSING ISRAEL'S APARTHEID (ADOPTED)

Lead Sponsor: Thomas Getman, Delegate, St. Mark's, DC

Co-Sponsors: The Rev. Rick Miles, Interim Rector, Grace Church, Georgetown; the Rev. David Wacaster, Rector, Good Shepherd; James Hamilton, Delegate, Grace Church, Georgetown; Mary Neznek, Delegate, St. Mark's, DC; John W. Harbeson, Delegate, Redeemer.

RESOLVED, that the 127th Convention of the Diocese of Washington submit the following resolution to the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church:

RESOLVED, that the House of _____ concurring, the General Convention of the Episcopal Church recognize that Israel's discriminatory legal system and treatment of the Palestinians correspond to the definitions of apartheid elaborated in the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid and set out in the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the General Convention condemn Israel's apartheid system as antithetical to the Gospel message and to our Baptismal Covenant to "strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being;" and be it further

RESOLVED, that the General Convention, recognizing the complicity of the U.S. government in supporting and protecting Israel in its apartheid practices against the Palestinians, and deeming that support antithetical to America's fundamental values, call on the President and the U.S. Congress to condemn and oppose Israel's apartheid by all appropriate means, including imposition of sanctions and suspension of military aid replacing economic aid to Israel with economic aid to the Palestinians.

EXPLANATION

The crime of apartheid is codified in international law. Article II of the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid summarizes it as "an institutionalized regime of systematic oppression and domination by one racial group over any other racial group or groups and committed with the intention of maintaining that regime." The Palestinian people qualify as a racial group under the Convention because they have been treated as a racial group.

Since the founding of the state of Israel in 1948, indigenous Palestinian Arabs who managed to avoid expulsion from their homeland have lived in Israel subject to a de facto regime of apartheid (until 1966, they were under martial law) because they lack Jewish "nationality". After Israel conquered East Jerusalem, the West Bank and Gaza in the 1967 War, Palestinians not excluded from remaining in those areas have lived under a military occupation of an even more severe apartheid-like nature.

Over the years many knowledgeable people argued that Israel should be deemed an apartheid state (e.g., "Report of UN Special Rapporteur for Palestine", John Dugard, 2007; "Occupation, colonialism, apartheid?" 2012, Human Sciences Research Council, South Africa). Others objected that, unlike South Africa, Israel did not intend to maintain an apartheid regime. This objection is no longer tenable.

In 2018, Israel enacted the Nation State Law into its "Basic Law" (equivalent to its constitution), which declared that "the right to exercise national self-determination" in Israel is "unique to the Jewish people," made Arabic no longer an official language, and established "Jewish settlement as a national value" which the state "will labor to encourage and promote." In 2020, Israel declared its intention to permanently annex more than half of the West Bank. To date, it has delayed execution of the decision, which would violate international law, but has not altered its intention. These two actions established beyond reasonable doubt that Israel intends to maintain an apartheid regime discriminating against all non-Jews it governs.

In response, leading human rights organizations (HROs) issued major reports documenting in detail how the term apartheid is fully applicable as a legal description of the human rights regime in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories.¹

Christian Churches have formally condemned Israel's apartheid as a "sin against God's children" and condemned U.S. government "complicity".²

In May 2021, 93 American rabbinical students issued an open letter identifying a "spiritual crisis" in the fact that "Israel upholds two separate legal systems."

Beginning as early as 1976, the Episcopal Church ever more forcefully opposed apartheid in South Africa. Christian churches have a special responsibility to stand with Jews against bigotry and discrimination. Likewise, we have a duty to support Palestinians against apartheid.

Adoption of this resolution would not impact the diocesan budget.

Discussion

Mr. Getman pointed out that in 1980 Archbishop Desmond Tutu invited U.S. Senator Mark Hatfield and others to witness the effects of apartheid in South Africa on the whole population. With the success of the anti-apartheid movement, Archbishop Tutu urged the United States and others to turn their attention to the Palestinians and suggested establishing a truth and reconciliation board. However, the Israelis responded that they could never forgive. Archbishop Tutu described Israeli apartheid as worse than South Africa's. Although there has been criticism about the use of the term "apartheid" in this setting, a recent U.S. Human Rights Watch report accused Israel of committing apartheid and crimes against humanity.

Mr. Getman continued that he has worked for peace in Israel and the Occupied Territories. He has witnessed the deaths of children and peace-seeking adults and the current deployment of U.S. weapons and resources to destroy Palestinian lands and infrastructure—including many structures funded by U.S. churches. Still, the ethnic cleansing and violent expansion of settlements continue. Hostile apartheid is antithetical to peace, and the Church should not keep quiet. Mr. Getman said passing the Resolution would indicate that the Diocese joins with HROs and other dioceses in condemning Israeli apartheid, that it recognizes that Israel's recent laws strip Arab Israelis of their rights, and that it urges the U.S. Congress to restrict military funding for Israel and apply sanctions against Israel until apartheid is eliminated.

JoAnn Appold, Christ Church, Clinton, expressed support for the Resolution. Kirsten Sherk, St. Columba's, supported the Resolution but noted that many churches organize trips to the Holy Land. She asked how the Resolution would affect travel to and relationships with St. George's College in Jerusalem.

The Rev. Ethan Bishop-Henchman, St. Paul's, K Street, spoke against the Resolution on the grounds that it uses the International Criminal Court's definition of apartheid, yet that court has not charged Israel with apartheid. The court is investigating possible charges of war crimes, and it would be prudent to wait until the court makes specific charges. Mr. Henchman did not think the Diocese had the authority or expertise to endorse the Resolution. Democrats and Republicans in the United States have denounced the use of the term "apartheid" to describe the situation. More appropriate, nuanced language should be used to condemn specific heinous acts by Israel.

The Rev. Meg Ingalls, Christ Church, Rockville, noted that the United States spends a lot of money on Israel. She proposed amending the Resolution to suggest that the United States shift its financial support from Israel to the Palestinians.

INGALLS AMENDMENT TO THE RESOLUTION ON OPPOSING ISRAEL'S APARTHEID

RESOLVED, that the General Convention, recognizing the complicity of the U.S. government in supporting and protecting Israel in its apartheid practices against the Palestinians, and deeming that support antithetical to America's fundamental values, call on the President and the U.S. Congress to condemn and oppose Israel's apartheid by all appropriate means, including imposition of sanctions and suspension of military aid replacing aid to Israel with aid to the Palestinians.

Discussion

Franklyn Malone, Our Saviour, Brookland, supported the amendment, as it speaks to fairness.

Ms. Neznek, a co-sponsor of the Resolution, suggested keeping the original language and adding the new language proposed by the Rev. Ingalls.

NEZNEK AMENDMENT TO INGALLS AMENDMENT TO THE RESOLUTION ON OPPOSING ISRAEL'S APARTHEID

RESOLVED, that the General Convention, recognizing the complicity of the U.S. government in supporting and protecting Israel in its apartheid practices against the Palestinians, and deeming that support antithetical to America's fundamental values, call on the President and the U.S. Congress to condemn and oppose Israel's apartheid by all appropriate means, including imposition of sanctions and suspension of military aid and replacing aid to Israel with aid to the Palestinians.

DISCUSSION OF NEZNEK AMENDMENT

Mr. Malone supported the amendment. Mr. Getman agreed that the Ingalls amendment brings some equanimity, which is needed, but it remains necessary to suspend military aid, because such aid robs assistance from other poor countries and provides machinery that is not needed in Israel. He supported the Neznek amendment.

The Rev. Dr. Harvey Bale, Jr., St. David's, asked whether it is appropriate to suggest replacing econom-ic and military aid to Israel with economic and military aid to Palestinians. He urged delegates to rec-ognize the enormous instability in the region and the fact that Israel is surrounded by countries that want Israel to disappear.

The Rev. L. Scott Lipscomb, St. Augustine's, supported the goal but said the Episcopal Church should not recommend imposing sanctions. When sanctions are used, the poorest people suffer, as in Afghani-stan, where women and children are facing starvation while

the Taliban regime is not suffering. The Rev. Wacaster, a co-sponsor of the Resolution, called the question. A supermajority voted in favor of calling the question.

The Neznek amendment was rejected by a majority.

DISCUSSION OF INGALLS AMENDMENT

The Rev. Dr. Peter Antoci, St. Thomas', Prince George's, called the question of the Ingalls amendment. A supermajority voted in favor of calling the question.

The Ingalls amendment was approved by a majority.

DISCUSSION OF RESOLUTION AS AMENDED

The Rev. Jon Musser, St. Anne's, said the impact of the Resolution on the Church's relationships or works in the region is not known. There is an historic precedent of Israel responding in a way that af-fected the work of an Anglican Archbishop in Jerusalem in 2012, but other resolutions have had no im-pact.

David Maglott, St. Nicholas', proposed specifying that economic aid is intended.

MAGLOTT AMENDMENT TO THE INGALLS AMENDMENT TO THE RESOLUTION ON OPPOSING ISRAEL'S APARTHEID

RESOLVED, that the General Convention, recognizing the complicity of the U.S. government in supporting and protecting Israel in its apartheid practices against the Palestinians, and deeming that support antithetical to America's fundamental values, call on the President and the U.S. Congress to condemn and oppose Israel's apartheid by all appropriate means, including imposition of sanctions and suspension of military aid replacing economic aid to Israel with economic aid to the Palestinians.

DISCUSSION OF MAGLOTT AMENDMENT

The Rev. Ingalls accepted the suggestion as a friendly amendment to the amendment.

Ms. Neznek read a statement from the Rev. Canon John Peterson, Washington National Cathedral, a co-sponsor of the Resolution, who was unable to attend the Convention. The Rev. Peterson was Dean of St. George's College in Jerusalem for 12 years and works to advance humanitarian causes in the re-gion. The Rev. Peterson wrote on January 19, 2022:

I wish I were here with you at the Convention, but I am grateful that Mary Neznek agreed to share with you my brief statement in full support of this Resolution opposing Israel's apartheid. "Apartheid" is a word that many Jews and evangelical Christians in the U.S. as well as the Jew-ish State of Israel detest, but the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu consistently throughout his long ministry challenged Israel as an apartheid state. No one knew better than the Archbishop what it meant to grow up in an apartheid state and all that it entails. One of Desmond Tutu's quotes that should guide all of us today as we consider this Resolution [comes] from his mes-sage to the Presbyterians in 2014¹: "The Sustainability of Israel as a homeland for the Jewish people has always been dependent on the ability to deliver justice to the Palestinians. I know firsthand that Israel has created an apartheid reality, with its borders

and through its occupation. The parallels to my own beloved South Africa are painfully stark indeed."

Bruce Gilchrist, Epiphany, DC, said aid to Israel is almost entirely military, so the proposed wording would likely result in only a minimal amount of money shifting to Palestinians. He spoke against the Maglott amendment.

The Rev. Beth O'Callaghan, St, Nicholas', called the question. A supermajority voted in favor of call-ing the question.

The Maglott amendment was approved by a majority.

DISCUSSION OF RESOLUTION AS AMENDED

The Rev. Michele Morgan, St. Mark's, DC, said the debate seemed to be pecking at the edges of a big issue. She hoped there would be more discussion about the issue across the Diocese. The Rev. Morgan supported the Resolution, noting that "apartheid" can be a scary word, but what is happening to the Palestinians is unjust. Passing the Resolution would be a loving act.

Nathan Brown, St. Paul's, K Street, called the question. A supermajority voted in favor of calling the question.

The Resolution was approved as amended by a majority.

The Rt. Rev. Budde acknowledged that several delegates did not have the opportunity to speak during the debate before the question was called. She encouraged participants to keep the conversation going across the Diocese. The Rt. Rev. Budde also acknowledged that an amendment was submitted but did not reach the floor for discussion. She said she and her colleagues would consider how to address such issues before the next virtual meeting.

RESOLUTION 6: ON DEFENDING THE RIGHT TO BOYCOTT (ADOPTED)

RESOLVED, that the 127th Convention of the Diocese of Washington submits the following resolution to the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church:

RESOLVED, The House of _____ concurring, the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church calls on the President of the United States and the U.S. Congress to oppose legislation penalizing or criminalizing support for nonviolent boycotts, divestment and/or sanctions on behalf of Palestinian human rights.

EXPLANATION:

Boycotts (the refusal to buy products or services of a person, company or country as a way to protest policies and actions) are an important form of expression protected by the First Amendment. The Su-preme Court has ruled governments may not dictate political beliefs as a condition for receiving public contracts. Nor may they punish those who engage in boycotts.

Boycotts as nonviolent political action to oppose injustice have an honorable history from Americans' pre-Revolutionary boycott of tea to the boycott of South Africa during apartheid, a boycott the Epis-copal Church strongly supported.

The call for boycott, divestment, and sanctions (BDS) issued by Palestinian civil society in 2005 launched a nonviolent movement patterned on the South African example. In its broadest form, BDS supports boycotts of and divestment from virtually all Israeli businesses and from businesses substan-tially involved with Israel. BDS does not call for the end of Israel but rather demands Israel comply with international law, respect human rights, and end the illegal occupation of Palestinian lands.

Over 100 measures have been introduced in state and local legislatures and in the U.S. Congress to pun-ish BDS supporters, including those who merely refuse to pledge never to boycott Israel. To date, more than 30 states have enacted anti-BDS measures, including many governors' executive orders.

The American Civil Liberties Union, along with other civil liberties groups, has actively opposed anti-BDS legislation as an infringement of the constitutional right to boycott and inimical to the principles of free speech. Many cases have been filed challenging application of anti-BDS laws and orders, but without a definitive resolution of the controversy. Fear of retaliation and of the social opprobrium that often accompanies unfounded charges of anti-Semitism have chilled individual and corporate willingness to sue to uphold their rights. For example, Unilever Corporation, which owns Ben & Jerry's Ice Cream, has not defended itself against divestment of its stock by several state governments as punish-ment for Ben & Jerry's' decision to cease doing business in Jewish-only settlements on the West Bank. Consequently, others who may wish to boycott Israel are often afraid to do so. Anti-Semitism is hostili-ty to or prejudice against Jewish people and Judaism. Criticism of the secular government of Israel and its policies is not anti-Semitic.

Whatever one's stance on BDS, in view of the ongoing assault on the right to boycott, this Resolution's defense of the First Amendment right to speak and to act nonviolently in accordance with one's con-science is required as a matter of honoring our baptismal vows.

Adoption of this Resolution has no impact on the Diocesan budget.

Discussion

The Resolution was approved by a majority.

REPORT OF THE TELLERS ON THE THIRD BALLOT

Ms. Dillard announced the results of the third ballot. The Rev. Meredith Heffner, St. James, Potomac, was elected the second clerical member of the Standing Committee.

SETTING OF THE DATE AND PLACE OF THE 2023 CONVENTION

Mr. Roachford moved that the One Hundred Twenty-Eighth Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Diocese of Washington be held at the Cathedral Church of St. Peter and St. Paul on Saturday, January 28, 2023.

The motion was approved by a majority.

ACTIONS CONCERNING REAL PROPERTY

March 2021: Approved the final sale of Accokeek Church.

April 2021: Approved \$2 million loan for St. Columba Episcopal Church for renovations and repairs to its property.

May 2021: Approved the sale of property belonging Grace Episcopal School to Montgomery County government, which exercised its first right of refusal to purchase the property.

October 2021: Approved financing for Church of the Ascension to put in an elevator.

January 2022: Approved the St John's Parish Olney mortgage refinance proposal. St John's Parish and School will enter a mortgage refinance over 15 years including a decrease in their Line of Credit.

OTHER BUSINESS

In addition to giving consent for all bishops elected in the Episcopal Church, recommending persons for ordination, and giving the Bishop advice and consent on the purchase, sale, or encumbrance of property held by a congregation or the diocese, the Standing Committee functions as the Bishop's Council of Advice, a role stipulated in the *Constitution of the General Convention*, Article IV and by *Diocesan Article 10* and *Canon 7*. The Standing Committee worked closely with Bishop Mariann Budde, Bishop Diocesan of Washington, and we commend her for her leadership in the diocese and Episcopal Church as well as her forthright and clear communication with the Standing Committee. Her leadership was particularly important as the Diocese entered its second year of operation under the public health emergency created by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Early in the year, Rev. Robert Phillip and the Standing Committee reviewed the role of the Standing Committee in reviewing candidates for ordination in the Diaconate and for Priesthood. The Standing Committee also participated in the Mutual Ministry Review for the Bishop, where she received high approval ratings for her overall performance.

Working with the Commission on Ministry (COM) and Rev. Yoimel Gonzalez Hernandez, the Committee discussed the formation and cultural environment for advancing Spanish-speaking candidates in the Diocese. There were a number of staff changes this year, the Bishop shared her thoughts on that and received feedback from the Standing Committee.

Along with the Bishop, the Standing Committee continued to work through the challenges created by the Covid-19 pandemic, touching upon the changing direction on in-person events, such as the Diocesan Convention, which was switched from a possible in person event to virtual, when a new variant spread rapidly through the region.

The Standing Committee continued to engage discussions about its role within the diocese and as council of advice to the bishop. Its goals for the upcoming year include:

- Continue to provide support and guidance to the Bishop in pandemic responses and initiatives.
- Provide guidance to the Bishop on the implementation of the strategic plan.
- Work with the finance committee and Diocesan Council to provide guidance on the sale or renegotiation of assets, as needed to sustain the viability of churches in the Diocese.

The Standing Committee is grateful for the Bishop and Diocesan staff who provided steadfast leadership through the second year of the Covid-19 pandemic and guidance with the strategic plan; along with the Rectors who continued to pivot to virtual formats to continue to bring God's word to the congregations of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE FEBRUARY 2021 — JANUARY 2022

The Finance Committee is a regular standing committee of the Diocesan Council. It consists of twelve members appointed by the Bishop with the consent of the Council, plus the Bishop and the Treasurer as *ex officio* members. The Committee normally meets monthly, with special meetings called as needed.

Pursuant to Canon 28, the Committee oversees preparation of the Diocesan budget and monitors its implementation. The Committee works closely with Diocesan staff throughout the budget cycle and reports to the Council on budget performance. In addition, the Committee reviews parish requests for approval of encumbrance or sale of parish property. The Committee reviews such requests in consultation with the requesting parish and makes recommendations to the Standing Committee, which has final authority, along with the Bishop, to approve or deny the requests. The Committee also has responsibility to review any parish requests for a loan from the Diocese.

The Committee also reviews and advises on other significant financial matters affecting parishes, and Committee members work with individual parishes facing budgeting, cash management, property development, and financial control issues, as requested.

The Chair of the Finance Committee is an *ex officio* non-voting member of the Diocesan Council and an *ex officio* member of the Diocesan Convention. Pursuant to a Council resolution, two members of the Diocesan Finance Committee serve alongside two members of the Bishop Walker School Finance Committee as a BWS Joint Oversight Committee, with responsibility for monitoring BWS budget development and financial operations.

DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD, THE FINANCE COMMITTEE COMPLETED THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE STANDING COMMITTEE:

St. Columba's: Recommended approval of a loan between St. Columba's and the Episcopal Church Building Fund of \$2,000,000, primarily for renovating the parish's sanctuary due to water damage from a faulty roof. The loan was approved with a stipulation that the parish provide the Diocese with regular updates on the loan and the project.

Grace Episcopal Day School: Recommended approval of the sale of the school's property to Montgomery County for \$7,500,000, which includes \$1,200,000 in escrow for repairs to the school building. The terms of the sale provide for a leaseback of the property to Grace School, with an initial term of ten years.

Ascension Church, Gaithersburg: Recommended approval of a \$225,000 refinancing by Ascension Church with the Episcopal Church Building Fund. The loan would allow the parish to replace a thirty-eight year old elevator and refinance its current mortgage.

St. John's Olney: Recommended approval of a \$1,745,000 refinancing of its mortgage and a \$500,000 revolving line of credit between St. John's church and Sandy Spring Bank.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL:

End of 2020 Financials: Recommended that the Diocese account for forgiveness of the PPP loan in the 2020 fiscal year.

Reallocation of Parish Assistance Grant Funds: Recommended reallocation of \$10,000 from the Parish Assistance Grant program to the Congregational Growth Grant program. This reallocation was used for the development of online technologies to better serve parishes during the pandemic.

St Margaret's: Recommended approval of a \$25,000 Parish Assistance grant to Charlie's Place homeless ministry. The ministry's finances have been impacted by the pandemic, and the ministry provides a badly needed service to the Washington community.

<u>Diocesan Budget:</u> Reviewed the draft 2022 Diocesan Budget and recommended Council approval; presented the approved budget to the 2022 Convention.

<u>Bishop Walker School Budget:</u> Reviewed the proposed Bishop Walker School 2021-2022 budget and recommended Council Approval.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL FEBRUARY 2021 — JANUARY 2022

Section 2708 of the Canons of the Diocese of Washington provides that the Diocesan Council is the executive committee of the Convention for business purposes when the Convention is not in session. The Council is responsible for the coordination, development, and implementation of the ministry and mission of the Diocese.

<u>February:</u> Council consented to two appointments by the Bishop to the Diocesan Finance Committee and reviewed Council's norms and goals for the upcoming year.

March: Bishop Mariann introduced two new diocesan staff members to Council - Amanda Anderson, Executive Assistant to the Bishops, and Hazel Monae, Missioner for Equity and Justice. The Council formally adopted its norms and goals for 2021. Council had an in-depth discussion on Proposed Canon for Diocesan Stewardship and Parish Vitality, with members of Council providing their thoughts and feedback. The Bishop asked Council members to complete the Bishop's Annual Review Survey.

April: Council voted to accept the Bishop Walker School 2021-2022 budget and to approve a minor revision to the school's bylaws. Council broke into small groups to discuss the planned check-ins with diocesan congregations and what questions Council would like congregations to answer in order for Council to be in the best position for making decisions for the diocese. Bishop Mariann updated the Council on the upcoming Special Convention, noting the proposed Canon for Diocesan Stewardship and Parish Vitality was substantially revised as a result of the listening sessions, including a shift in language from the word Vitality to Viability. Council received a report from the Finance Committee and voted to accept the resolution for authorization of COVID-19 Parish Assistance Grants for 2021.

May: Bishop Mariann introduced the Rev. Anne-Marie Jeffery, the new Canon for Congregational Vitality. Council spent time debriefing the recent Special Convention, at which the Canon for Diocesan Stewardship and Parish Vitality was passed. Hazel Monae, Missioner for Equity and Justice, updated Council on upcoming events and

initiatives, and Jonathan Nicholas reported on the work of the Reparations Task Force. Council voted to allocate funds from the Episcopal Church toward the equity and justice work of the diocese. Council received the Bishop's evaluation and approved her updated position description. Council received the Finance Committee report and approved the housing allowance for Anne-Marie Jeffery. Bishop Mariann reported that the separation with Christ Church, Accokeek was complete.

June: Council received a report from the Congregational Growth Grants Committee, which focused on the upcoming cycle of grant applications. Canon Andrew Walter reported on the Strategic Plan and the upcoming 90-day action items. Canon Robert Phillips presented his ideas for providing pastoral care to those congregations undergoing an assessment under the new Canon 54. Bishop Mariann updated the Council on the progress of check-in calls with congregations.

July: No Meeting held.

<u>August:</u> Council approved a new Board Member for Bishop Walker School. Maxine Jones and Jackie Belton (Sr. and Jr. Wardens of Trinity Episcopal Church, Upper Marlboro) presented a request for Canon 54 Assessment, and in response, Council approved the creation of and proposed composition of the Assessment Committee for Trinity, Upper Marlboro. Bishop Mariann explained the data from the parish checkin calls Bishop Mariann announced that Bishop Chilton had tendered her resignation and would going to the Diocese of Chicago to be the Assisting Bishop for a period of time while Bishop Elect Paula Clark continued her recovery. Steve Gibson, Chair of the Finance Committee, presented the Finance Committee's report, noting the diocese's year to date results were ahead of target.

September: Council approved the new Missioner of Faith Formation and Development job description. Hazel Monae, Missioner for Equity and Justice, gave the Council a recap of the equity and justice work that had been completed and spearheaded over the past six months, highlighting the intention to equip individuals and congregations with spiritual and intellectual resources and tools to deepen their commitment to the work of equity and justice. The Rev. Maria Kane, Chair of the diocesan Human Resources Committee, reported that health benefits would not change other than a slight increase in the premium, which is well within the average for other dioceses across the country, and the Committee recommended Council approval for a 3% cost of living adjustment for clergy and lay employees in the diocese. Council approved the recommendations of the Human Resources Committee. Bishop Mariann announced the Rev. Lisa Barrowclough as the Dean for Chaplains. Canon Andrew Walter reported on the first meeting of the Assessment Committee for Trinity, Upper Marlboro, and the Council voted to appoint Janice Smith as the Chair of the Assessment Committee for Trinity Upper Marlboro. Council received the report of the Finance Committee, with Steve Gibson stating the financial situation looks good and Canon Andrew Walter reminding the Council that throughout the fall season, feedback from the Council and Regional Gatherings on the 2022 draft budget will be important. Council spent time acknowledging and thanking Bishop Chilto for her service to the diocese.

October: Council approved Congregational Growth Grants in the amount of \$107,990 to be distributed to 13 parishes. Mildred Briones Reyes, Latino Missioner, gave a report

of Latino Ministry in the Diocese of Washington. Canon Andrew Walter provided the Finance Committee's report, stating that the diocese had a clean audit for the previous year and the financials for the current year were in a good position, with strong congregational giving and expenses remaining under control. Bishop Mariann spoke to the Council about the Strategic Plan, noting that the diocese will continue to focusing current initiatives, but in addition, heading into the third year of the plan, the diocese will also begin working toward other goals in the Strategic Plan, namely launching or relaunching up to three worshiping communities focused on reaching rising generations and Creation Care.

November: The Council received an update from the Co-Chairs of the Claggett Center's Raise the Barn Capital Campaign and discussed the diocese making a gift to the campaign. No decision was made on a gift but a subgroup of Council would make a recommendation on a gift at the Council's December meeting. The Council received the report from the Assessment Committee for Trinity, Upper Marlboro, which included a recommendation that the diocese take conservatorship of the parish's assets. Canon Andrew Walter explained the canonical next steps in the Canon 54 process, which required the Council transmitting a copy of the Assessment Committee's report to Trinity, Upper Marlboro. Council approved a requirement for proof of vaccination in order for delegates to attend Diocesan Convention.

December: Council approved the Diocese of Washington making a gift of \$150,000 to the Claggett Center Capital Campaign Fund, with money to come from the Wilmer Fund. Steve Gibson, Chair of the Finance Committee, provided the Finance Committee's report, stating that budget for 2021 and the proposed budget for 2022 are both balanced. Bishop Mariann updated the Council on plans for the Friday night of Diocesan Convention, which would be an event with a particular focus on reaching rising generations. Council spent time listening to Maxine Jones and Jackie Belton, the Wardens of Trinity, Upper Marlboro, as they provided the parish's point of view on the recent report from the Assessment Committee. Council then formed a small working group from the Council to think about next steps in the Canon 54 process and make recommendations to the Council at its next meeting in January. Council approved the payment of \$200 per person, per month (annual \$2400) to eligible Seton Belt retirees.

January, 2022: Bishop Mariann updated the Council on plans for Diocesan Convention at the end of the month. Based upon recommendation from the Council subgroup, Council approved a motion to recommend to the Bishop that Trinity Church, Upper Marlboro be placed into conservatorship and that title and control of the assets and real property of the parish be transferred to the Diocese until such time as a permanent disposition plan can be developed and implemented. Council approved the 2022 Draft Budget to be presented at Diocesan Convention. Council voted to support a recommendation that the Bishop encourage all congregations to provide clergy and lay employees with a mental health week in addition to paid vacation. Council thanked departing members for their service to Council.

Annual Reports of the Commissions, Committees, and Task Forces of the Diocese of Washington

127TH CONVENTION, JANUARY 29, 2022

REPORT OF THE CONGREGATIONAL GROWTH GRANT COMMITTEE

Congregational Growth Grants are intended to provide funds for initiatives which foster revitalization and growth of our congregations and create fresh expressions of Episcopal worshipping communities through collaborative models of ministry.

The members of the committee include Leza Boodie, Paul Brewster, Charles Day, Patricia Dorn, The Rev. Linda Kaufman (Chair), Maureen Shea, and William Stafford-Whittaker. Mildred Reyes serves as diocesan staff liaison, who handles all logistics and many of the administrative tasks of the committee.

During calendar year 2021, the committee completed one grant cycle, in the fall, disbursing a total of \$117,990.00 in grants. Other funds budgeted for Congregational Growth Grants were used by the Diocese for emergency support during the pandemic.

When we opened the current round of Congregational Growth Grants during the summer of 2021, we were not sure what to expect. Would people jump on it and send lots of proposals? Would people be so overwhelmed by everything they had no bandwidth? The reality is that we received 17 proposals (60% higher than Fall of 2019). The vast majority were requests for equipment or technical assistance to go to the next level with livestreaming and virtual connections. Because the applications were so tech-heavy, we requested help from Peter Turner, Information and Technology Director for EDOW. He graciously read each proposal and provided us with both a technical assessment and how we might best proceed. His assistance was invaluable.

The committee, with deep involvement of all members, read each proposal, pondered what else we would need, and discussed the merits and concerns of each application. We then decided on follow-up questions. Each parish was contacted to gather more information. Also, because the combined grant request was over \$225,000, we made the unprecedented decision to reduce the cap on each grant to \$10,000 from the original \$20,000 we have used in the past. Part of the conversation with each parish was to discuss what they would do if the grant were capped at \$10,000. Every parish understood the challenge of this peculiar time, and graciously agreed to our request.

The actual grants made are listed below. All of those granted were for technology support.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES

The Committee on Human Resources monitors issues related to clergy and lay employees in the Diocese, and when appropriate, recommend changes in procedures, human resources policies, or insurance plans to Diocesan Council.

In advance of Annual Enrollment for 2022, the committee recommended that the Diocese continue to offer the 5 health plans in 2022 that were offered in 2019, 2020, and

2021, emphasizing the importance of maintaining continuity and lessening confusion during the pandemic.

Upon review of the Consumer Price Index for the Washington, D.C. region the Committee recommended that Diocesan Council approve a 3% Cost-of-Living Adjustment for 2022. The committee also recommended that the Council affirm the committee's recommendation that parish leaders consider merit and other performance-based pay for exceptional service during the last year.

With the loss of the committee's three lay members in the summer and fall, we invited regional deans to identify lay leaders in their region to whose expertise and experience would make for ideal committee members.

Plans for 2022 include drafting and adoption of a new manuals for clergy and laity. The last clergy handbook was updated in 2003. To assist in that work, the committee began a review of the clergy handbooks of other dioceses of similar size and consulted with Bishop Budde and Canon Philipps on needs particular to the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN HUNGER FUND COMMITTEE

The Diocesan Hunger Fund Committee oversees the disbursement of grants from the Diocesan Hunger Fund. Specifically, grants are provided to programs that feed those faced with hunger and malnutrition in the Diocese of Washington.

2021 GRANTS

In 2020 grants ranging from \$2,500 to \$10,000 were awarded to the following 9 programs and organizations. Grants are usually limited to \$5,000 but the one \$10,000 grant was made due to circumstances beyond their control.

This figure represents an increase of \$6,400 over the grants made in 2020 to 9 organizations. It was gratifying to see the increase in funding for a change, and we believe it can be attributed to the increased awareness on the part of the general public of the problem of hunger in our area.

We hope that with the gradual slowing of COVID-19 infections will continue and even become minimal, although it has proven to be changeable enough not to be too confident. We also hope that the increased awareness of the problem of hunger will NOT follow decrease, but will in fact encourage people to continue to invest in alleviation efforts.

Committee members continuing to serve in 2021 Ms. Janis Evans, Mr. William MacKaye, Ms. Lee Mericle (chair) and Ms. Patrice Rohde. Additional committee members would be gratefully welcomed.

2021 FUNDRAISING

Plans for possible regional fundraising activities continued to be on hold due to the pandemic as well as the small number of committee members.

PLANS FOR 2022

The dwindling membership of the Committee makes recruiting new folks to participate, as committee members and/or as helpers with social media, a pressing issue. The Committee spent some time with Ms. Hazel Monae, former Missioner for Equity and Justice of the Diocese. Plans to increase membership were suggested but we were unable to get them going.

We worked with the EDOW staff to overhaul the Hunger Fund web pages (pages plural!) and have been very pleased with the results. Janis Evans continues her work on the Hunger Fund Facebook page.

We ask for your prayers and support, especially so that we may increase the level of support we provide in 2022.

REPORT OF THE INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

The Investment Committee was established in 1950 in order to provide professional supervision of the investment funds belonging to parishes, separate congregations, missions, and the Diocese which are invested in the Diocesan Investment Fund. The Fund was valued at \$45,229,255 as of December 31, 2021 and has 50 participants including the Diocese.

The Ruth Gregory Soper Fund came under the management of the Diocese in 2013 and was valued at \$40,476,659 as of December 31, 2021. Vanguard Institutional Advisory Services serves as the investment manager for both the Diocesan Investment Fund and the Ruth Gregory Soper Fund.

Members of the Committee are Episcopalians who are members of the investment and financial community who possess the expertise and experience to guide the investment process and oversee the performance of Diocesan investments. The Committee believes that the professional supervision that it offers is to the benefit of all Diocesan parishes, separate congregations, and missions in the investing of their funds, and the Committee encourages participation in this Fund.

The Committee also reviews those Trusts of which the Diocese is a beneficiary to ascertain that those trusts are being invested appropriately so as to maximize the return to the Diocese while minimizing risk to ensure that the Diocesan objectives of income and reasonable growth consistent with safety are being met. Hence, the Investment Committee monitors the W. Seton Belt Charitable Trust, of which St. Barnabas Parish is a co-beneficiary, and the W. Seton Belt Retired Clergy Fund, both of which PNC Bank is the trustee. The Charitable Trust was valued at \$53,416,306 as of December 31, 2021, and the Retired Clergy Fund was valued at \$3,680,214.

The investment objective of both the Diocesan Investment Fund and The Ruth Gregory Soper Fund is to maximize long-term total return (i.e., income plus appreciation/ depreciation) consistent with prudent risk parameters and employing a balanced portfolio approach. The importance of asset allocation and diversification is well recognized as an important tool in the management of investment risk. As a result, the Committee has explored in depth the benefits of investing in multiple asset classes (U.S. equities that include large, mid, and small-cap companies, international equities, real estate equities, and fixed income). The Committee has adopted an asset allocation strategy of investing in multiple asset classes that perform differently under varying market conditions, with those asset classes to be periodically strategically rebalanced. The goal of this approach is to reduce risk and enhance returns over time by taking advantage of the varying correlations among different asset classes. Typically, the broad asset allocation consists of roughly 60-75% equities (stocks) and the balance in fixed income securities. The Investment Committee receives and reviews reports from Vanguard Institutional Advisory Services for the Diocesan Investment Fund and the Ruth Gregory Soper Fund, including reports on investment performance, and meets with the managers on a regular basis. The Committee also received reports from PNC for the W. Seton Belt Charitable and Retired Clergy Trusts and meets periodically with its managers as well.

The Committee's Statements of Investment Policy for both the Diocesan Investment Fund and The Ruth Gregory Soper Fund summarize the principles, policies and procedures, including socially responsible screens for individual investments, under which those funds are managed. Those Guidelines are available on the Diocesan website. The Committee also establishes asset allocation guidelines for these funds which are reviewed and updated periodically. Quarterly reports from the investment manager on these funds, including investment performance, are posted on the Diocesan Website.

REPORT OF INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

Diocesan Council of the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Washington Washington, DC

OPINION

We have audited the financial statements of The Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Washington (the Diocese), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related statement of activities for the year ended December 31, 2021 and the statements of functional expenses and cash flows for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Diocese as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

REPORT ON SUMMARIZED COMPARATIVE INFORMATION

We previously audited the Diocese's 2020 financial statements and we expressed an unmodified opinion on those audited financial statements in our report dated September 27, 2021. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented in the statement of activities for the year ending December 31, 2020 is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it had been derived.

BASIS FOR OPINION

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Diocese and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

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In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Diocese's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021 AND 2020

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

The Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Washington (the Diocese) is an organization comprising member parishes and missions located in the District of Columbia, Charles, Montgomery, Prince George's and Saint Mary's counties in Maryland. The primary purposes of the Diocese are governance of the Diocese through the Bishop and the Diocesan Convention; programs dedicated to activities of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church; mission and evangelism work in the Diocese; and congregational ministry.

The Diocese is a not for profit, religious organization and is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. There are no uncertain tax positions for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. The Diocese is not required to file an information return with the Internal Revenue Service

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the Diocese are maintained on an accrual basis in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). The accounts are segregated by separate funds established in accordance with specified activities, purposes or restrictions.

ESTIMATESS

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and amounts of revenues and expenses reflected during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

COMPARATIVE FINANCIAL INFORMATION

The statement of activities includes summarized prior year information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with GAAP. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Diocese's audited financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2020, from which the summarized information was derived.

COVID-19 RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The ongoing COVID 19 coronavirus pandemic (COVID 19) continues to have a global impact creating uncertainty, volatility, and disruption across economies and financial markets. The Diocese's operational and financial performance will depend on certain developments, including the duration and spread of the outbreak and its impact on the Diocese and its donors, employees and vendors.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued) COVID-19 Risks and Uncertainties (Continued)

As such, COVID 19 could have a material adverse effect on the Diocese's financial position in the future. The ultimate duration and impact of the COVID 19 outbreak on the Diocese's financial position cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Diocese has evaluated subsequent events for disclosure and recognition through September 27, 2022, the date on which these financial statements were available to be issued. All material subsequent events have been disclosed as of that date.

Effective January 1, 2022, the Diocese is required to adopt the Financial Accounting Standards Board's (FASB) Accounting Standard Codification (ASC) 842, *Leases*. The Diocese's present value of future minimum lease payments, which represent minimum annual rental commitments for non cancelable operating leases with lease terms greater than one year will be subject to this new guidance and will be recorded on the Diocese's statement of financial position as a lease liability with a corresponding right of use asset. The adoption of this standard will impact the Diocese's statement of financial position but is not expected to have a material impact on its results of operations or cash flows.

NET ASSETS

Net assets, revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor restrictions.

Net assets with donor restrictions – Some donor imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the fulfillment of a donor specified purpose or the passage of time. Other donor imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, when the stipulated time has elapsed, or both.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insures amounts on deposit with each financial institution up to limits as prescribed by law. The Diocese considers all highly liquid debt instruments with an initial maturity of 90 days or less to be cash equivalents. The Diocese may hold funds with financial institutions in excess of the FDIC insured amount; however, the Diocese has not experienced any losses in such accounts and management believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

INVESTMENTS AND MEASUREMENT OF FAIR VALUE

The Investment Fund is a vehicle for long term investment of restricted and non restricted funds of the Diocese and funds of certain parishes, separate congregations, and missions of the Diocese. Income distributions to the Diocese are included as additions to the appropriate fund

The Investment Fund is a vehicle for long term investment of restricted and non restricted funds of the Diocese and funds of certain parishes, separate congregations, and missions of the Diocese. Income distributions to the Diocese are included as additions to the appropriate fund.

The Diocese invests in mutual funds and equities, which are recorded at fair value. Investment income or losses, net are reported as operating activities, while the current year changes in fair value of investments (realized and unrealized gains and losses) are reported as non operating activities.

The Diocese's classifications for investments are based on the GAAP fair value measurement standard, which established a three level hierarchy framework. The framework is based on the inputs used in valuation and requires that observable inputs be used in the valuations when available. The disclosure of fair value estimates in the fair value guidance includes a hierarchy based on whether significant valuation inputs are observable. In determining the level of hierarchy in which the estimate is disclosed, the highest priority is given to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs that reflect the Diocese's significant market assumptions.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

<u>Level 1</u> – Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities traded in active markets, to which the Diocese has the ability to access. <u>Level 2</u> – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets

or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted market prices that are observable for the assets or liabilities for substantially the entire period, and market corroborated inputs.

<u>Level 3</u> – Inputs to valuation methodology are unobservable and are significant to the fair value measurement.

Fair values are based on quoted market prices when available (Level 1). The Diocese receives the quoted market prices from third party nationally recognized pricing services. When market prices are not available, the Diocese utilizes a pricing service to determine an estimate of fair value, which is mainly used for fixed maturity investments. The fair value is generally estimated using current market inputs for similar financial investments with comparable terms and credit quality, commonly referred to as matrix pricing (Level 2). In instances where there is little or no market activity for the same or similar instruments, the Diocese estimates fair value using methods, models and assumptions that management believes are relevant to the particular asset or liability. This may include discounted cash flow analysis or other income based approaches (Level 3). These valuation techniques involve some level of management estimation and judgment. (Audit Page 9)

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

FUNDS INVESTED BY PARISHES

The Diocese invests funds on behalf of the parishes. These funds recorded as both an asset and a liability for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. The funds are included in the investments, fair value asset and classified as a funds invested by parishes liability in the statements of financial position. The Investment Fund is a vehicle for long term investment of certain funds of the Diocese and of the parishes, separate congregations, and missions of the Diocese that have elected to utilize such services. The objective of the Investment Fund is to seek dividends and to attain an appreciation in value that, together with interest income, exceeds the effects of inflation. The Investment Fund is held by the Diocese in the name of the Diocese. While the Diocese is committed to maintaining the amounts as being attributable to the parishes, congregations, and missions as participants in the Investment Fund, these funds are not absolutely insulated from claims of creditors against the Diocese.

PARISH GIVING RECEIVABLES

Annual giving receivables of parishes and missions are recognized as revenue, based on amounts collected during the year and estimates of amounts to be collected as of the end of the fiscal year. These estimates are based primarily on amounts collected subsequent to the fiscal year end. Each receivable balance is assessed at the end of the year to determine if an allowance for bad debt is appropriate. No allowance was deemed necessary for the years ended December 31, 2021 or 2020.

NOTES RECEIVABLE

The Diocese enters into loan agreements with individual parishes and employees. The notes receivable balance consists of advances made to parishes, secured loans made to assist members of the clergy in purchasing a residence and other short term advances to employees and members of the clergy. The receivable balance is assessed at the end of the year to determine if an allowance for bad debt is necessary. Refer to Note 9 for additional details.

PLEDGES RECEIVABLE

Pledges receivable that are expected to be collected within one year are reported net of any estimated uncollectible amounts. Contributions expected to be collected beyond one year are reported net of any estimated uncollectible amounts and are discounted to present value using a discount rate ranging from 2 to 3%.

ALLOWANCE FOR UNCOLLECTIBLE PLEDGES

The Diocese has established an allowance for uncollectible contributions based on management's judgment of the creditworthiness of the donors, past collection experience, and other relevant factors. No allowance for uncollectible pledges has been recorded as of December 31, 2021 or 2020.

LAND AND BUILDINGS

Upon closing of a parish under the Diocese's jurisdiction, all property including land and buildings for the parish becomes the Diocese's property. The property is recognized at the lower of the appraised value or the state income tax assessment at the time the property is assumed by the Diocese. Depreciation is not recognized on occupied buildings of the Diocese; rather, costs incurred to make improvements to buildings are capitalized and depreciated to the extent they meet the Diocese's threshold for capitalization.

PROPERTY, EQUIPMENT AND DEPRECIATION

Property and equipment purchases greater than \$1,000 are carried at cost net of accumulated depreciation and depreciated using the straight line method over their estimated useful lives of 3 to 10 years. Donated items are carried at the estimated fair value at the date of donation.

BENEFICIAL INTERESTS IN PERPETUAL TRUSTS

The Diocese recognizes as restricted revenue and as net assets restricted in perpetuity, its beneficial interests in perpetual trusts held by third parties when notified of the trust's existence. Under the terms of the trust instruments, the Diocese has irrevocable rights to receive the income earned by the trust assets in perpetuity, but never receives the original corpus. Such revenue and assets are recorded initially at fair value with adjustments to such value, as changes occur, based on information reported by the trustees. Annual income distributions from the trusts are reported as revenues that increase net assets with restrictions or net assets without restrictions depending on the nature of donor restrictions on distributions. Adjustments to the initially reported assets are recognized as gains or losses restricted in perpetuity.

GIFTS AND GRANTS

The Diocese receives contributions throughout the year. The Diocese recognizes contributions when an unconditional promise to give is received. Contributions received for a specific purpose or subject to a passage of time restriction are recognized as restricted revenue in the statements of activities. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as gifts and grants without donor restrictions in the statements of activities.

CONDITIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS AND REFUNDABLE ADVANCES

Conditional promises to give, with a measurable performance or other barrier and a right of return, are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met. Contributions received prior to meeting the conditions are reported as refundable advances in the statements of financial position.

CONDITIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS AND REFUNDABLE ADVANCES (CONTINUED)

On April 28, 2020, the Diocese received a loan pursuant to the Paycheck Protection Program (the Program), a program implemented and federally authorized under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, for an aggregate principal amount of \$816,097 (the PPP Loan). The Diocese elected to account for the PPP Loan in accordance with the FASB ASC 958 605 Conditional Contribution model. Under this model, the PPP Loan is recognized as revenue when conditions are substantially met. Management determined that all conditions including eligibility for forgiveness of the PPP Loan were substantially met as of December 31, 2020. Accordingly, for the year ended December 31, 2020, the Diocese recorded contribution revenue on the statement of activities amounting to \$816,097. The Diocese applied for forgiveness and received a response from M&T Bank on February 10, 2021 that the Diocese's loan forgiveness application was confirmed by the Small Business Administration.

DONATED SERVICES

The Diocese receives contributions of services from various donors, parishioners and volunteers. These services consist primarily of advisory and administrative support. Such services are not recognized as revenues and expenses in the statements of activities as the value of those services do not meet the requirements for recognition in accordance with GAAP.

FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, these expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The costs of program and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, salaries, employee benefits, and various other overhead costs have been allocated based on estimates of employee time and effort. All other expenses are allocated directly based on the nature of the expense.

NON OPERATING GAINS (LOSSES)

Changes in the fair value of investments and beneficial interests in perpetual trusts, distributions from trusts, and the net change in funds held for others are reported as non operating gains (losses) in the statement of activities.

RECLASSIFICATIONS

Certain 2020 balances have been reclassified to conform to the 2021 presentation.

The Diocese regularly monitors liquidity required to meet its operating needs, while also striving to maximize the investment of its available funds. The Diocese has various sources of liquidity at its disposal, including cash and cash equivalents and marketable securities. The Diocese considers financial assets, informally designated through the budgeting process for special purposes by the Diocesan Council, as available for general use.

In addition to financial assets available to meet general expenditures over the next 12 months, the Diocese operates with a balanced budget and anticipates collecting sufficient revenue to cover general expenditures. Operating revenue consists of Parish giving, Bishop's Appeal contributions, releases from the Soper Trust designated to fund operations, and general contributions. Restricted contributions are maintained with the designation with donor restrictions and are not considered to be available for general expenditure. In addition, notes receivable are excluded from financial assets available to meet general expenditures as they are due in 2032 or amounts due from employees with flexible repayment. See Note 9.

The purposes of these net assets without donor restrictions, which are not board designated, but are segregated for internal budgeting purposes, are as follows:

<u>Funds invested in real property</u> – This amount represents funds invested in undeveloped mission sites, mission churches and vicarages and property and equipment owned by the Diocese.

Closed parish funds – Represents funds from the sale of parish property.

Soper Income Fund – The Soper income fund has been established to reflect the receipt of income from the Soper Fund, which formerly formed the corpus and accumulated income held within a perpetual trust established by Ruth Gregory Soper. On December 12, 2012, the Diocese and the Trustee agreed to a settlement agreement that terminated the Ruth G. Soper Trust. Since 2004, the Council approved the use of Soper income to supplement funding for the operating budget of the Diocese. Following the dissolution of the trust and the receipt of the assets comprising the trust, the Diocese determined the amounts to remain as net assets restricted in perpetuity based upon the value at the time the Diocese became the sole beneficiary of the Trust. The Diocese has determined that the amount of income distributed from the Soper Income Fund will continue to be determined using the same total return methodology that was applied by the Trustee of the Ruth G. Soper Trust. Under that methodology, the amount of income distributed during each year to the Soper Income Fund is equal to 5% of the average balance of the Soper Fund as of December 31 of the most recent three years. Distributions from the Soper fund for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 were \$1,408,417 and \$1,919,370, respectively, and are presented within distribution from trusts in the statement of activities. Missionary development fund – Established in 1969, these funds are used for parish loans and other missionary property acquisitions, renovations, repairs and maintenance.

<u>Wilmer conference center</u> – Funds are available to lend to parishes in amounts up to \$35,000 for five year periods.

<u>Edward Williams and Edward Corten funds</u> – These funds were established for tracking future projects and is reserved for special use at the Council's discretion.

<u>Bishops Housing Funds</u> – This fund is used to provide housing loans to the Bishops and diocesan clergy relocating to the metropolitan DC area.

<u>Phillips fund</u> – This fund is used to support the missionary clergy and the purchase of debt free missions.

Bishop John T. Walker School fund – This fund is used to support the operations of the Bishop John T. Walker School for Boys (BWS), a tuition free Episcopal school serving boys and their families living east of the Anacostia River. BWS is an unincorporated operating unit of the Diocese.

Information relative to the utilization of the income on the trusts and funds listed individually is as follows:

W. Seton Belt trust – Income from the trust is restricted to the aid of retired clergy, support of homes for the aging, and other related charitable purposes. The distributions from the trust during the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 were \$788,397 and \$752,212, respectively.

<u>Katherine Winthrop Kean fund</u> – This fund was established by a bequest in 1975 with income to provide "Christian hospitality to strangers of all denominations in the nation's capital." Funds are disbursed on approval by the Bishop.

Angus Dun Fellowship fund – This fund was established in 1971 with income designated to provide support for clergy continuing education. Funds are administered by and disbursed on approval of the Angus Dun Committee.

St. Mary's Normal and Industrial School fund – (Farm Property) – A trust created in 1897, from which income is administered and distributed by the St. Mary's Scholarship Committee for aid to minority students in St. Mary's County.

George C. Remey fund – Income from this fund is to be used for the benefit of the poor, the needy, and others needing assistance.

<u>Bishop John T. Walker School Endowment fund</u> – Income from this fund is available for use for expenses associated with the Bishop John T. Walker School.

<u>Ruth M. Hoxie fund</u> – By bequest of Evelyn N. Sherril in 1968, income from this fund is to be used to provide housing for needy, aged persons.

Margaret Wister Meiger Girls Friendship Society Memorial fund – When the Girls Friendship Society ceased operations in 1974, its assets were turned over to the Diocese with the income to be used for work with and for women.

<u>Seminary Support fund</u> – Funds provide educational support for seminarians and are paid directly to the seminary as partial offset of tuition.

Note 6 - Endowment Funds

The Diocese has received endowments in the form of investments. These funds are used to support the various needs and programs of the Diocese. The endowment, which consists of twenty funds, is subject to the provision of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) of the District of Columbia. The Diocese has interpreted the District of Columbia's UPMIFA as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. The Diocese classifies investment income as restricted until such time that it is appropriated for use. Unrealized gains and losses are classified as changes in net assets with donor restrictions. The Diocese manages the endowment in the same manner as its other investment holdings.

INVESTMENT POLICY

Restricted funds held by the Diocese are invested with the objective of preserving the long term, real purchasing power of assets while providing a relatively predictable and growing stream of annual distributions in support of the Diocese. The funds have a goal of achieving a return consistent with its spending policy plus the inflation rate as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) over a full market cycle. No more than 75% and no less than 45% of the funds' assets may be invested in equity securities, active equity mutual funds, passive equity index funds, private capital funds, and/or hedge funds. The balance may be invested in active and/or passive bond funds, real estate investment trusts, and diversified commodity funds.

NOTE 9 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

NOTES RECEIVABLE

Notes receivable include loans made to members of the clergy to assist in purchasing their residences. These loans are secured by subordinate deeds of trust on the property financed. The total outstanding balance of these loans totaled \$300,000 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020. These notes accrue interest that is calculated at such time that the notes become due and, generally is equal to a percentage of the increased value in the financed property. The percentage expresses the relationship between the principal amount loaned and the value of the property financed at the time of acquisition. There is a ceiling on the amount of contingent interest ultimately payable that is equal to a stated percent per year simple interest of 8%.

The Diocese also makes cash advances to Parishes. The total amounts outstanding on these advances as of December 31, 2021 and 2020 were \$208,370. In addition, the Diocese makes short term advances to employees and clergy members. The total amount outstanding on these advances as of December 31, 2021 and 2020 was \$16,917.

As of December 31, 2021 and 2020, no bad debt allowance has been established as the Diocese is not aware of any changes in the financial condition of the borrowers that would affect their ability to honor their respective obligations.

BISHOP JOHN T. WALKER SCHOOL

The Diocese currently operates the Bishop John T. Walker School for Boys (BWS) as an unincorporated operating unit of the Diocese.

In accordance with bylaws approved by the Diocesan Council, the operation of BWS is governed by a Governing Board comprising 21 30 members who are elected by the Council upon the recommendation of the Governing Board and nomination by the Bishop. A majority of the members must be communicants in good standing of the Episcopal Church and eligible to vote at a parish in the Diocese. The Diocesan Council must approve amendments to the bylaws of BWS. Revenues and expenses associated with BWS are recorded in a designated fund maintained by the Diocese. In October 2010, the Diocese received a restricted gift of \$223,654 from the German Orphan Home of the District of Columbia (GOH Gift). Pursuant to the agreement under which the GOH Gift was made, the income from these funds is available for use of the BWS. The GOH Gift is recorded as a fund restricted in perpetuity of the Diocese.

NOTE 10 - GUARANTEES

The Diocesan Council periodically agrees to guarantee the payment of loans made to parishes by third parties. The Diocese has not been notified of defaults by the issuing institution nor is it aware of deterioration in the financial condition of the parishes that would impact their ability to honor their respective obligations. In addition, the Diocese has pledged two certificates of deposit to financial institutions in case of default on the Saint Nicholas or Saint George's outstanding loan. These certificates of deposit of approximately \$131,000 and \$130,000 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively, are included in the certificates of deposit in the statements of financial position.

NOTE 11 - RETIREMENT PLANS

The Diocese participates in multi employer defined benefit retirement plans provided by the Church Pension Group (the Group). All clergy employed by the Episcopal Church and full time lay employees with a minimum of one year's service are eligible to participate in The Fund's Clergy Pension Plan (the Clergy Plan) and The Episcopal Church Lay Employee' Retirement Plan (the Lay Plan), respectively. The Clergy Plan and the Lay Plan are exempt from the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 as church affiliated plans. The Group's audited financial statements as of March 31, 2022, disclosed that the Clergy Plan was in an overfunded position with net assets available for benefits of \$14.82 billion and accumulated plan benefit obligations of \$6.68 billion. The Group's audited financial statements as of March 31, 2022, disclosed that the Lay Plan was in an overfunded position with net assets available for benefits of approximately \$265.8 million and accumulated plan benefit obligations of \$222.55 million. The Diocese may be held liable for its portion of any unfunded liability. No liability was recorded in the financial statements for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. The total contributions by the Diocese to the Group were \$278,880 and \$296,134 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 13 - LAND AND BUILDINGS

The Diocese owns the following parcels of land and buildings, which are carried on the statements of financial position at a value totaling \$1,579,657 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020. A summary of the properties is as follows:

Bright Seat Road, Landover, MD – The Diocese owns this property which was rezoned in June 2010 to permit the development of residential townhouses. The Diocese is accepting, though not actively seeking, offers from developers to either purchase the property upon site plan approval, or to enter into a venture opportunity with a developer. The land was carried at value of \$359,887 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020.

<u>Father Hurley Boulevard, Germantown, MD</u> – The Diocese owns this property which is available for sale to developers for the purpose of building town homes, though is not currently listed on the market. The land was carried at value of \$943,716 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020.

Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard, Washington, DC – The Diocese owns a townhouse lot adjacent to the Holy Communion Church. The townhouse lot is undeveloped and used as a playground. The land was carried at value of \$276,054 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020.

NOTE 14 - BISHOP WALKER SCHOOL SUBLEASE

The Diocese entered into a sublease for BWS to occupy a portion of the Town Hall Education Arts Recreation Campus (THEARC) in Washington, DC. The lease commenced November 1, 2017 and has a term of 10 years. During 2016, the Diocese prepaid rent in the amount of \$500,000 in accordance with the sublease agreement. The Diocese amortizes this prepaid rent over the life of the lease. In addition to rent, the Diocese pays its share of operating expenses based on square footage occupied. In December 2017, the Diocese entered into an agreement to sublease space on the site of the Holy Communion Church, previously occupied by BWS. The lease commenced January 1, 2018 and was terminated December 31, 2020. In February 2022, a new tenant began subleasing the space through December 2022. The lease agreement provides for monthly lease payments of approximately \$42,000 over the term of the lease.

This table is provided in response to a resolution of the 1976 Convention that the salary and allowances of each diocesan and parochial ecclesiastical and administrative position be published annually in the Journal.

Cash salary figures are supplied by (1) Diocesan staff (2) the Parochial Report supplements for 2019 and (3) the Church Pension Fund.

Utilities allowance has to be fixed at a dollar value in order to use the accepted formula for the value of houses owned by the church as rectories, vicarages, etc. Value of church owned housing is computed on the same basis as it is for the Church Pension Fund: 30% of cash salary plus utilities, cash housing allowance and SECA allowance.

Cash for housing is the dollar amount provided in place of rectory, vicarage or other church-owned property. In some cases it includes utilities.

Total compensation is the sum of cash salary (including any allowance for clergy self-employment tax or FICA), utilities and housing. The Church Pension assessment is 18% of this compensation and is wholly paid by the parish or other employer.

Other allowances are most commonly payments for use of a personally-owned vehicle for church business, business-related entertainment and other official expense.

Other benefits available on a Diocese-wide basis include: Group Life insurance of \$50,000 (\$150,000 for clergy, and \$100,000 for Diocesan lay staff), disability insurance, and health insurance coverage (including dental) at the following rates:

A personal obligation of the clergy is the payment of Social Security taxes on the basis of the self-employed person. The rate for 2022 is 12.40% of earnings up to \$147,000 and 2.9% on the first \$200,000 net earnings. There is no limit on the earnings subject to the Medicare (hospital insurance) tax. The value of housing as well as cash for housing is included in this calculation. Parishes often include half of this, or 7.65%, as part of clergy compensation packages.

^{**} The High Deductible Health Plan requires an annual contribution to a Health Savings Account (HSA) by the employer. The contribution is 50% of the annual deductible to be paid by March 31, 2022.

PART IV: DIOCESAN POLICIES

(LAST EDITED 2020)

COMMITTEE GOVERNANCE POLICY

(ADOPTED BY DIOCESAN COUNCIL 5/11/2004; REVISED 2020)

SEC. 1. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER AUTHORITIES.

- (a) This committee governance policy shall apply to any committee established by a resolution of the Convention, Diocesan Council, or Standing Committee described under section 4402 of the Canons of the Diocese.
- (b) A resolution that establishes a committee may be amended by the entity that passed the resolution. Therefore, the entity that established a committee may make adjustments, provide oversight, and maintain control over the operation of the committee. By amending the establishing resolution, the entity may at any time change the conditions applicable to the committee, including the conditions under section 4403 of the Canons. The provisions under section 4403 only apply as a default if the entity does not address a particular issue by a resolution. For example, an entity may set the termination date of a committee when it is first established, change the termination date after it is established, or allow for a termination under section 4403.
- (c) (1) This committee governance policy is subject to any provision of the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese.
 - (2) Any resolution establishing a committee shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, except the Canons may authorize alternative provisions of the resolution to apply instead. (See section 4403 of the Canons).
 - (3) This committee governance policy shall be subject to a resolution of the Convention, Diocesan Council, or Standing Committee establishing a committee. To the extent that any provision of this policy is inconsistent with any provision of that resolution, the provision of the resolution shall govern.

SEC. 2. TASK FORCES.

- (a) A task force is a group of individuals established to preliminarily explore the nature of a particular issue, identify areas of focus, and develop measurable, achievable goals and objectives. A task force is not a committee for purposes of this governance policy. A task force may be appointed before a committee is established, but there is no requirement that a task force is established first. There is no requirement that a committee shall be established because a task force was established.
- (b) A task force may be established by the Bishop, Convention, Diocesan Council, or Standing Committee. The members of a task force shall be appointed by the entity that establishes it or in a manner as directed by the entity that establishes it. If the task force concludes that a committee should be established on the particular subject matter the task force shall submit a statement to the entity that established it on the reasons for the establishment of a committee, the fiscal impact and costs of the committee, and an identification of funding sources.

SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF A COMMITTEE.

The Convention, Diocesan Council, or Standing Committee may establish a committee by resolution. If a task force was established to perform exploratory work before the establishment of a committee, the Convention, Diocesan Council, or Standing Committee shall consider the report of the task force in establishing the committee. The resolution should contain standard language of accountability, including a provision that calls for a complete evaluation of the work of the committee after a period of approximately 3 years after its establishment. Section 4404(f) of the Canons provides for a termination date for a committee, but a committee may be extended, have a different termination date, or be made permanent by a resolution. The resolution establishing a committee shall summarize the areas of focus, and serve as the charge to the committee. The body established in the resolution shall be called a committee.

SEC 4. COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP.

- (a) The resolution establishing the committee shall state who appoints the members of the committee and whether consent or consultation are required by a particular entity. There should be approximately 11 members and the total number of voting members should be an odd number to avoid a committee being deadlocked in a tie vote and left unable to act. Generally, when the Bishop appoints members, the Bishop shall consult with involved individuals, including members of the Convention, the Diocesan Council, or Standing Committee and any task force that preceded the committee. Members of a preliminary task force will be considered for appointment, but are not guaranteed appointment to the committee. There should be an appropriate distribution of membership to provide balance on the basis of clergy and laity, race, gender, region, and parish. The members of the committee may make recommendations for future members.
- (b) Some individuals may be appointed as non-voting members in a consultative capacity, such as clergy who are not clerical members of the Convention or individuals who are not communicants of this Diocese in good standing. Those non-voting members appointed in a consultative capacity shall serve for terms and be subject to term limitations in the same manner as voting members.

SECTION 5. SUBCOMMITTEES.

- (a) A subcommittee is an operational unit of a committee that is performing ongoing work of the committee. Before a subcommittee may be established, the committee shall submit a plan for approval to the Diocesan Council (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee). The plan shall include a description of the duties, authorities, and functions of the subcommittee and a system of terms and term limitations. The annual report of the committee submitted to the Convention and Diocesan Council shall include a report from the subcommittee on the goals, objectives, and work of the subcommittee during the year.
- (b) The Bishop (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee) and the committee chair shall appoint the chair of a subcommittee, with the consent of the committee. Members of the subcommittee are appointed by the chair of the committee and the chair of the subcommittee.

(c) Membership of a subcommittee is not necessarily totally drawn from the membership of the committee. Any member of a subcommittee who is not a member of the committee (including the chair) shall meet the qualifications of committee membership and be subject to the same terms and term limitations as the committee.

SECTION 6. AD HOC TASK FORCES OF COMMITTEES.

An ad hoc task force of a committee is a group of individuals who are members of that committee, except an individual with specific expertise who is not a member of the committee may be appointed to the task force. The chair of the committee shall appoint the members with the consent of the committee. The ad hoc task force shall examine a particular issue on behalf of the committee or complete a specific project, and then disband. The lifespan of an ad hoc task force rarely exceeds a few months. If the work of an ad hoc task force continues for a year or longer, the committee shall evaluate whether the task force has become ineffective, is evolving into a subcommittee (which would need to meet the requirements of section 5), or for good reason needs to continue for a short, specific time.

SECTION 7. ASSIGNMENTS.

Assignments to a committee arise from the purposes, functions, duties, and authorities of the committee in the resolution establishing the committee. From time to time, the Bishop, Diocesan Council, Standing Committee, or Diocesan staff may ask the committee for assistance in exploring a particular subject related to the duties of the committee.

SECTION 8. ACCOUNTABILITY AND ANNUAL REPORT.

A committee shall submit a report to the Diocesan Council (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee) at least once a year. This is an opportunity for a mutual review, and the report and discussion should take the form of what has been accomplished that year and a mutual decision as to the goals and objectives for the coming year. Any changes relating to matters in the resolution establishing the committee (such as the title, purposes, functions, duties, authorities, or membership) are required to be made by a resolution.

SECTION 9. ACCOUNTABILITY TO CONVENTION.

- (a) Section 305 of the Canons provides that (if not otherwise a member of Convention) a committee chair has seat and voice, but no vote at any meeting of the Convention. The committee chair is responsible for producing a short, written report (1–2 pages) for the Convention, to be submitted on the first working day of each year. The report appears in a packet of information at the Convention, is posted on the diocesan website under the information for that committee, and appears in the Journal of the Diocese.
- (b) Unless otherwise included in the budget, there is generally a nominal amount (\$100 to \$300) in the Diocesan budget for the clerical costs of a committee. Each committee should make any budget request for funding to the Diocesan Council not later than October 1 of the year preceding the year in which the funds are to be made available. Budget requests should be part of the annual review under section 8. Committees may identify possible funding sources, but not engage in fundraising

without the approval of the Diocesan Council (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee).

Section 10. Liaisons with Committees.

- (a) A member of the Diocesan staff should be assigned to each committee as a liaison. The relationship varies with the committee and with the individual chair, but the purpose is to be in relationship on behalf of the Bishop, and to help facilitate the flow of meetings and work for the year. Every committee needs to be aware that there is very little in the way of support staff at Church House and arrange for its own clerical work.
- (b) Members of the Diocesan Council may be appointed to some committees to serve as a liaison between the committee and the Diocesan Council. This is most likely to occur when some critical work is being doing by the committee, but may occur at other times or for other reasons.

SECTION 11. TERMINATION OF COMMITTEES.

- (a) Any committee that is terminating under section 4404(f) of the Canons or under a provision of the resolution establishing the committee shall submit a report to the Diocesan Council (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee) not later than 90 days before the date of the termination. The report shall include a summary of the achievements of the committee and a recommendation of whether or not the committee should terminate or be extended.
- (b) The Diocesan Council (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee) should conduct a complete review of each committee every 3 to 5 years. Following the review process, the Diocesan Council (or the Standing Committee in the case of a committee established by the Standing Committee) may choose to terminate a committee, for any of a variety of reasons, including that the work of the committee has been completed, there has been a change in focus of the mission and work of the Diocese, or the committee has become ineffective or non–functional.

DIOCESAN LOAN POLICIES

A. POLICY FOR DIOCESAN GUARANTEES OF CONGREGATION LOANS (ADOPTED BY THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL IN 2001, AMENDED IN 2008 AND 2012)

Among the resources of the Diocese of Washington are the buildings and grounds of the congregations of the Diocese. One of the important ministries of every congregation is adequate maintenance of existing structures and capital equipment. A number of church buildings and the surrounding land, including cemeteries, are historic sites in the Washington area. In every neighborhood the church building is an important community resource. Above all else, these buildings are the places where God is worshiped and prayers on behalf of God's creation are offered. Thus, every effort must be made by the congregations that call these buildings their "church home" to ensure that these buildings are maintained so that ministry now and in the future can be sustained.

Further, all Christians are called to go forth and preach the gospel to all nations. This may mean that congregations may be called upon to expand their mission and thus renovate and expand existing church buildings. Such a call to renew and/or expand a congregation's mission and building or expand structures requires substantial capital resources in order to finance such an undertaking. Good stewardship and effective fundraising are a critical and primary component to such a mission. There is no outside source, including the Diocese, which can substitute for a congregation's own financial support for its ministry.

When preparing to undertake any building improvement or expansion congregations are to exercise all possible efforts to secure financing without a diocesan guarantee. Lenders will almost inevitably request such a guarantee, if it is generally available, even when the lender would be willing to proceed without it. Congregations receiving permission from the Committee on Church Architecture to build and/or renovate existing property and from Finance Committee and the Standing Committee to encumber property should make every effort first to secure financing without a diocesan guarantee.

Under extraordinary circumstances the Diocese will consider guaranteeing a congregation's loan. Examples of such circumstances may include: major repairs without which a church could not function; the building of new worship or program space during a time of increased growth within the parish, yet at a time in which without the new space the growth will subside and/or cease altogether; a congregation with a substantial membership of low income people who can sustain the operation of a parish, but lack sufficient personal, financial resources to support building renovations, repairs and expansion. The guarantee program of the Diocese requires the following of participating congregations:

- 1. The congregation would follow the existing process of submitting building master plans and/or proposed designs to the Committee on Church Architecture for review, and submitting these same plans to the Finance Committee, along with the following information:
 - a. Parochial reports and audits from the previous three years;
 - b. A statement of income and expense of the current fiscal year;

- c. A current balance sheet;
- d. A description of all fundraising activities for the building and a statement of funds received to date and funds anticipated, specifying the timeframe in which these funds would be received;
- e. A case statement for the project;
- f. A statement about current membership and projected growth;
- g. A statement about current pledges and anticipated growth
- 2. The congregation will provide a deposit to the Diocese for the equivalent of six monthly mortgage payments on the date the loan documents are signed. This cash will be placed in an interest bearing account under the control of the Diocese. All interest earned will be the property of the Diocese.
- 3. The congregation will negotiate with the lender a covenant that after five years of timely mortgage payments, the bank will release the Diocese from the guarantee, pending approval of the Finance Committee. This effectively limits the number of years that a guarantee will be in place. The congregation will also arrange with the lender to have mortgage payments deducted from their checking account to ensure timely payments.
- 4. At the end of five years when the Diocese is released from the guarantee, the parish will receive their deposit back, less any payments made on their behalf to the bank, and net of any loan. The parish will not receive any of the interest earned on this deposit.
- 5. During the time the guarantee is in place, the parish will submit quarterly financial reports to the diocesan Treasurer in a format acceptable to the Finance Committee. The diocesan Treasurer will maintain a schedule that includes the amount of loan outstanding, the amount of monthly payment, the amount of deposit, the amount of any loan made from the Closed Parishes Fund and the date of the most recent report. This report will be added to the reserve schedule for monthly distribution to the Diocesan Council.
- 6. To qualify for the guarantee, a congregation must have submitted the most recent parochial report and audit on time. If a congregation has not complied, the congregation must do so within 30 days and then resubmit their request to the Finance Committee. The congregation must agree to submit all required diocesan reports in a timely manner during the time of the guarantee.
- 7. At the time of request for a guarantee the congregation must be current with their payment of the pledge to the Diocese. Further, the congregation must agree to meet the expectation of moving to the tithe at the rate of 1% a year, if the congregation is not already tithing.
- 8. If a congregation is unable to make a loan payment, they must notify the bishop in writing and request that the Diocese make a payment on their behalf from the deposit. The Bishop will authorize the payment and notify the Finance Committee chair and the Treasurer of the payment. The Bishop in consultation the Finance Committee Chair and the Treasurer and other appropriate staff will determine

the next steps needed to assist the congregation. Notification to the Diocesan Council will be done through the monthly report unless the Bishop determines that additional actions are needed. If the Diocese depletes the deposit, Council will receive a written report from the Finance Committee describing what actions will be needed to assist the congregation in resolving their financial situation.

All requests for loans to congregations must receive approval of Standing Committee. All requests for a Diocesan guarantee must be approved by Diocesan Council. At no time will the Diocese provide total cumulative guarantees in a nominal amount of more than 50% of unrestricted net assets of the Diocese, nor shall a guarantee provided to any one congregation amount to more than 10%, of the unrestricted net assets of the Diocese as shown on the audit report of the most recent fiscal year. Should total cumulative guarantees exceed the set limit for cumulative guarantees, no additional loans or loan amounts may be guaranteed by the Diocese until total cumulative guarantees are brought below that set limit. Should the guarantee to any one congregation exceed the set limit to a single congregation, no further loans or loan amounts may be guaranteed to that one congregation until that congregation's guarantee amount is brought below that set limit. This will safeguard the Diocese's financial assets and ensure the adequate monitoring of the participating congregations.

B. Policy for Short-Term Loans to Parishes

(Adopted by the Finance Committee in 1980 and amended in 1985, 1993, and 2008)

- 1. Priority will be given to parishes with the greatest financial need, and parishes must demonstrate, in their application for a short–term loan, why other resources are not available or adequate. Parishes with other resources must provide justification for using diocesan rather than parish funds.
- 2. Amount: \$35,000 or less; larger loans will be handled on a case-by-case basis.
- 3. Interest rate: Interest rates are to be set at closing at the then prevailing interest rate of five (5) year U.S. Treasury instruments plus .0175 (1.75%), but not less than .06 (6%). Interest rates shall be fixed for the 5–year term.
- 4. Repayment period: The standard repayment period is five years; however, the committee is prepared to grant exceptions where warranted.
- 5. The committee will consider each loan request on its particular merit.
- 6. While the Diocese will consider a wide range of possible uses for short–term loan proceeds, loan requests will generally be denied for such purposes as restoring operating funds and in instances where the use of other funds is more appropriate.
- 7. The granting of a loan does not relieve the parish of the responsibility to pay its Diocesan commitment.
- 8. Each loan request must include:
 - a. A complete description of the project/endeavor for which the loan is intended, including detailed, substantiated costs;
 - b. Parochial reports and audits from the previous three years;
 - c. A statement of income and expense of the current fiscal year;

- d. A current asset sheet;
- e. A description of all fundraising activities for the building and a statement of funds received to date and funds anticipated, specifying the time frame in which these funds would be received;
- f. A case statement for the project;
- g. A statement about current membership and projected growth;
- h. A statement about current pledges and anticipated growth;
- i. A proposed monthly repayment plan, supported by budgeted funds; and
- j. Justifying data to support the parish's need for a loan.

C. POLICY FOR LARGE LOANS TO PARISHES

(Adopted by the Diocesan Council in 1980, amended in 1993 and 2008)

FUNDS AVAILABLE TO BE LOANED AND LENDING CRITERIA:

Each year, the Diocesan Council will establish a limit for large—loan Missionary Development Funds (MDF) for the purpose of funding extraordinary missionary opportunities. Extraordinary missionary opportunities are those that reach beyond the normal functions of mission and outreach for all parishes and seek to develop new ministries, programs or special projects targeted at increasing Church membership and participation.

MAXIMUM AMOUNT TO BE LOANED TO ANY PARISH:

\$200,000, with exceptions approved on a case-by-case basis.

TERMS:

- 1. The loan shall be for a period of five years at a fixed interest rate. Monthly payments shall be made as if the loan was for a period of 20 years, and a balloon payment of the balance will be due at the end of the five—year period. Interest rates are to be set at closing at the then prevailing interest rate of five (5) year U.S. Treasury instruments plus .0175 (1.75%), but not less than .06 (6%). Interest rates shall be fixed for the 5—year term.
- 2. In the absence of extraordinary and compelling circumstances, the loan will be renewed for successive 5–year periods, but will not be renewed after the twentieth year. Upon each renewal, the Diocese may adjust the interest rate and other terms.
- 3. The loan shall be secured by a deed of trust with the highest possible priority covering the parish's real estate and approved by the Standing Committee. In addition, the parish shall comply with such of the conditions respecting aided parishes as the Council shall determine upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee (see accountability standards below).
- 4. The Diocese shall arrange for the preparation of the loan documents, at the expense of the parish.
- 5. All loans shall require the approval of the Council.

PROCESS:

- 1. Loan requests should be submitted to the Bishop who, after review with the staff, would route them to:
 - a. The Committee on Church Architecture, if appropriate, for review of the building plans;
 - b. The Moderator of Council and the Canon to the Ordinary, who would determine whether or not the proposed project represents an extraordinary missionary opportunity;
 - c. The Finance Committee, for review of the parish's financial condition and ability to carry the loan.

2. Each loan request must include:

- a. A complete description of the project/endeavor for which the loan is intended, including detailed, substantiated costs;
- b. Parochial reports and audits from the previous three years;
- c. A statement of income and expense of the current fiscal year;
- d. A current asset sheet:
- e. A description of all fund-raising activities for the building and a statement of funds received to date and funds anticipated, specifying the time frame in which these funds would be received;
- f. A case statement for the project;
- g. A statement about current membership and projected growth;
- h. A statement about current pledges and anticipated growth;
- i. A proposed monthly repayment plan, supported by budgeted funds; and
- j. Justifying data to support the parish's need for a loan.
- 3. Reports from the above committees would be submitted to the Moderator of the Diocesan Council. The Moderator could request that further work or review be undertaken by any of the committees, or could recommend the loan to the Diocesan Council.
- 4. The Diocesan Council would act on the loan request.

FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY STANDARDS FOR PARISHES RECEIVING LOANS:

- 1. The proposed annual budget of the church will be submitted for review two months before the start of the church's fiscal year. Following the completion of the every member canvass, any changes in the budget shall be submitted to the Finance Committee for review.
- 2. Quarterly financial statements using the form contained in Appendix B of "Audit Procedures in the Diocese of Washington" will be submitted in duplicate to the Chair of the Finance Committee through the Business Affairs Office.
- 3. Record keeping shall be done in a manner at least as rigorous as that specified by the Manual for Treasurers of Missions and Aided Parishes."

- 4. An every member canvass with personal contacts shall he held each year.
- 5. There shall be an annual audit of the church's accounts according to the standards stated in the "Audit Procedures in the Diocese of Washington."
- 6. In view of the substantial amount of the loan, a liaison member of the Finance Committee shall be appointed to discuss and review with the treasurer of the parish any deviations from budget figures, or any plans for special fund drives, or any other activities of the parish that would reflect on its financial strength.

DIOCESAN AUDIT GUIDELINES

Each parish within the Diocese of Washington is responsible for submitting audited financial statements to the Bishop of Washington. These statements must be received by September 1st of the year following the calendar year being reported. To ensure financial statements are fairly stated, canon law requires an annual audit be completed by each parish. For direction in completing the annual audit, in January of 2003 the Diocesan Council adopted the audit guidelines established by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the USA (DFMS).

These guidelines are included as Chapter VI in the *Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs* which is published by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the USA. In addition to the audit guidelines, the manual includes a great wealth of useful information aimed at assisting congregations in effectively running the business of the church, including information relating to tax, financial management, insurance, and other issues. This manual is available on The Episcopal Church website at *www.episcopalchurch.org*. The audit guidelines allow the following three types of financial audit be conducted by a parish:

- 1. Audit by independent CPA (Certified Public Accountant)
- 2. Audit by independent PA (Public Accountant)
- 3. Audit by Committee chosen by parish

These guidelines were created for parishes that choose to do an audit by committee instead of engaging a CPA or PA to perform the audit. The guidelines outline the steps and processes necessary to adequately review the financial statements and internal accounting controls of a parish.

Two changes, which were recommended by the Diocesan Finance Committee, are incorporated into the audit guidelines approved by Council. Both of these changes affect bullet 5 on page VI–3 of the manual, discussing the committee audit. First, the final sentence in the second paragraph of bullet 5, dealing with reimbursement for out–of–pocket expenses, was deleted. Second, the following sentence was added as the second sentence to the third paragraph under bullet 5: "A committee member may be someone, other than a CPA, who is engaged by the congregation to perform the committee audit, as long as the Committee Audit Guidelines and format are followed."

The text of the Introduction portion of the guidelines is below (including the two diocesan changes listed above and appropriately marked, that were adopted by our Council). For the other sections (Audit Program Checklist, Sample Audit Committee Certificate, Instructions for the Audit Program), please refer to the *Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs*.

- <u>1. Purpose:</u> These audit guidelines were developed to assist auditors in performing the annual audit of the books of account of the congregations of the Episcopal Church.
- 2. Reasons for an Audit: Annual audits are required by the Canons of the Episcopal Church for all parishes, missions, and other institutions. The primary purpose of an audit is to assure that financial statements are fairly stated. Any person handling the monies or investments of the church needs an audit to protect the church assets

and him/her against suspicion of mishandling those assets. Similarly, rectors, vestries, vicars, bishop's committees, treasurers, and other persons in positions of responsibility may be liable for any losses which would have been discovered by an ordinary audit but were not discovered because they failed to have an audit conducted.

In addition, an announcement to the congregation that a completed audit reveals that all monies and investments are properly accounted for will have a positive impact on stewardship.

3. Pre–Audit Advice: When meeting with the auditors, be prepared to discuss your plans and objectives. Auditors are in the position to advise you and serve your interest when they understand the goals you have set and when you can clearly explain what you expect and hope to get from their services.

Keep good records and help your auditor save you money by not using professional time for routine work, such as gathering information.

Keep your auditor informed of changes and new directions in the congregation.

The treasurer and others, such as Vestry members, rectors, and staff, should be available to the auditor to provide any needed information.

A copy of the *Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs* should be made available to the auditors.

- 4. Approved Auditors: The canons permit the auditing of congregational accounts by "an independent Certified Public Accountant," by "an independent licensed public accountant," or by "such committee as shall be authorized by the Finance Committee, Department of Finance, or other appropriate diocesan authority."
 - a. *Certified Public Accountant:* Very often the complexity and/or size of congregations necessitate an independent examination and reporting on their financial statements.
 - Certified Public Accountants offer several levels of service. These include the audit, the compilation, and the review. Refer to the Glossary of this manual for definition of these terms. Neither a review nor a compilation is acceptable in place of an audit of a parish, mission, or other institution of the church.
 - ii. Certified Public Accountants engaged in public accounting are available to all who wish to engage them for independent accounting skills. These skills consist primarily of the design and installation of financial systems, audits, investigations and reports based on audits, advice on management and financial policies, and tax return preparation.
 - iii. Certified Public Accountants have met the statutory requirements of a state or other political subdivision of the United States as to age, education, residence, moral character, and expertise, and have passed.
 - iv. Certified Public Accountants are permitted to advertise their services. This should help you in your search. Generally, when people do not know an accountant in the community, they will ask friends to recommend

- someone. Businesspersons, especially those in the not-for-profit field, can be helpful in finding an accountant with expertise in the not-for-profit sector. Lawyers and bankers can be of assistance as well.
- v. Fees are based on time charges. Moreover, fees vary with the level of experience of those required to perform the work. The prevailing cost of conducting a practice in the community will affect professional audit fees. Fees also vary based upon the time of year the audit work is performed.
- b. *Independent Licensed Public Accountants:* While the CPAs and PAs are both licensed to perform the same public accounting services, they prepare differently to become licensed. A Public Accountant has a license based solely upon public accounting experience.
- 5. The Committee Audit: These Audit Guidelines were specially prepared for audit by committees. The Audit made by an audit committee will be termed a Committee Audit. The Auditor's Opinion Letter of an Audit Committee will be termed an Audit Committee Certificate. The Auditor's Comments on Internal Control we be termed Audit Committee Findings on Policies and Procedures.

Audit committee members should be independent of the decision making and financial record keeping functions of the congregation. The members of the audit committee should have sufficient financial skills and experience to conduct a competent audit. It might be appropriate to offer reimbursement to the audit committee for out–of–pocket expenses.

An audit committee may consist of one or more individuals. A committee member may be someone, other than a CPA, who is engaged by the congregation to perform the committee audit, as long as the Committee Audit Guidelines and format are followed. The actual number of members should be determined by the size and scope of the audit.

- 6. Scope of the Committee Audit: The scope of the audit shall include:
 - a. Sufficient tests of transactions to assure compliance with these guidelines and adequate control of the assets of each congregation.
 - b. Verification (or preparation) of financial statements in the form approved for the Episcopal Church as set forth in this manual. Refer to Chapter III (Bookkeeping).
 - c. A review of management control practices using the Internal Control Questionnaire found in Chapter II (Internal Controls).
- 7. Accounts to be Audited: All accounts must be audited. The audit requirement covers not only the operating accounts of the organization, but also all its restricted, endowment, and property funds, and the accounts, if any, of its organizations. No church money is exempt from the requirement of an audit. If a separate auditor has audited an account of a separate treasurer, the report should be included in the consolidated financial statements.
- 8. Objectives of the Audit: The major objectives of an audit of a congregation are to ascertain the following:

- a. That the various transactions during the year are proper and are documented appropriately (*i.e.*, authorized, complete and accurate);
- b. That the various transactions during the year are recorded in the proper amounts and in the proper accounts;
- c. That the assets, liabilities, income and expenses, which should be in the financial records, are so shown in the proper amounts and in the proper accounts;
- d. That, to the extent feasible, adequate internal control procedures were and continue to be in effect; and
- e. That the financial statements for the year were prepared from the financial records and present fairly the financial position and changes in net assets and cash flows of the congregation.
- 9. Timing of the Audit: The Canons call for a church fiscal (*i.e.*, financial) year ending on December 31 of any given year. The engagement of the auditor should be done prior to the end of the period being examined. This timing allows the auditor to include certain audit procedures that can only be performed at year—end.
- 10. Contents of the Audit Report: The auditor is responsible for submitting an audit report to the Vestry of the church. The Audit Report shall consist of:
 - a. The Audit Committee Certificate;
 - b. The Statement of Financial Position;
 - c. The Statement of Activities;
 - d. The Statement of Cash Flows;
 - e. Completed Audit Program Checklist;
 - f. The Audit Committee Findings on Policies and Procedures; and
 - g. A corrected parochial report as a result of audit adjustments, if applicable.

11. Filing of the Audit:

- a. Prior to actual delivery of the audit report, the Vestry should issue a letter to the auditor stating that all records have been available for audit and there are no funds omitted.
- b. Upon completion, the Audit Committee shall present the audit report to the Treasurer, Rector, and Wardens.
- c. Any findings and recommendations should be presented in the Audit Committee Findings on Policies and Procedures, not in the Audit Committee Certificate. These items will be discussed with the Treasurer or other responsible persons and within 30 days their written response, attached to the audit report, is presented to the Vestry.

- d. The Vestry receives the audit report upon completion.
- e. A copy of the audit report should be filed with the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority not later than 30 days following its completion and never later than September 1 of each year, covering the financial reports of the previous calendar year. The minutes of the Vestry will officially record the receipt, acceptance, and subsequent filing of the audit report with the Ecclesiastical Authority.
- f. If, at any time during the audit, the records suggest that something is seriously wrong, the matter should be brought immediately to the attention of someone of superior authority, as well as the appropriate diocesan authority.

Policy Statement on Disposition of Proceeds from Sale of Real Estate Assets

(ADOPTED BY DIOCESAN COUNCIL 5/9/2006)

The Episcopal Diocese of Washington has formulated this policy statement as a guide for dealing with the disposition of real estate asset sale proceeds. No prior policy statement can be identified as existing. Asset sales, by their very nature, tend to be long term in their perspective. We endorse this same concept when putting these resources to use. Use of any proceeds should align with the mission/vision of the Diocese. They should and will not be used for normal operating expenses.

Each situation will present its own unique set of circumstances. The timing of each sale will also come at a unique time for the Diocese – where we can envision an almost unlimited opportunity to put these assets to use for varying needs, projects, and ministries. We believe these guidelines need to provide a fundamental direction for the use of these proceeds. While Council needs to show some sensitivity, flexibility, and creativity to respond to the needs of the moment, we recommend the basic guidelines serve as the foundation for all decisions on the use of sale proceeds.

Prior to determining any use of these proceeds, the original source of the funds used to acquire the asset will be researched to determine any commitments, restrictions, or requirements that may apply to ensure we properly dispose of the proceeds.

- 1. Proceeds from asset sales will primarily be used for (prioritization is not implied):
 - purchase of new land
 - church plants
 - building/renovation projects including accessibility
 - congregational development and renewal
 - renewable investments (start-up or seed loans)

Use of these proceeds could take the form of a grant, reimbursable grant, loan, or investment. Council will establish a process and procedures by which requests can be administered according to these guidelines.

2. All monies received from sale proceeds will be separately accounted for to ensure they go toward the intended use. Investment income on these monies will be kept within these funds and not used for other purposes.

3. Council will be responsible for making all decisions regarding the use of asset sale proceeds. Council will also be responsible for the review, revision as necessary, monitoring, and application of these guidelines on behalf of Convention. Council will task the appropriate committee or staff to execute all decisions.
